Wake Up the Sun. May Day is the traditional start of the Morris Dance season. All over the world, dancers rise before the sun to dance in the dawn and insure that the sun comes up for another year. It seems to work, so join the Portland Morris at Council Crest for this, our third annual celebration of spring.

The second annual PCDC Playford Ball is scheduled for the regular first saturday English dance in May. Consider this an opportunity to dress in the finery of another era, an age of elegance and subtlety, where more than the touch of another's hand courted impropriety, but so much could be said with the eyes and a smile.

Evo and Jemmy Bluestein are a versatile brother duet who perform on many American folk instruments. Their repertoire includes duet and solo vocal style associated with blues, cajun, ballad, bluegrass, celtic, and yiddish traditions as well as more contemporary material. Northwest Folklife Festival. Every year to mark the beginning of summer, the Seattle Folklore Society opens its doors to folk musicians, dancers and artisans from all over the northwest for one of the biggest free folk festivals in the country. Over Memorial Day weekend, Seattle Center sprouts twelve to fifteen stages which feature drums from Africa to Japan, fiddles from Finland to Tailand, and lots of musical diversity in between. There are workshops and dances, craft fairs and fresh air. Don't miss this amazing display of crosscultural pollenization. Come to folklife.

Raphael House Benefit. Raphael House is an emergency shelter for women and children run by the Holy Order of Mans. They are sponsoring a benefit dance at Multnomah Art Center on May 30th. Beginning at 7:30, the first hour of the dance will be geared towards beginners and families with children. More challenging dances will be introduced later in the evening. Synopsis of regular dances

Unless stated, all dances are open to everyone—experienced or not, with or without partners, and feature live music. All dances are taught and children are admitted without charge. At any PCDC dance where sit-in musicians are encouraged to play, they will be admitted free.

PCDC First Friday Dance. This contra dance at MAC showcases local and regional callers and dance bands. Cost is \$3.50 for seniors and PCDC members, others \$4.50. If you'd like to call or book a band for this dance, please contact PCDC. Musicians are encouraged to sit in with the hired band, but will not be miked. A beginners workshop is held at 7:30.

PCDC English Country Dance. English Country dance is a source of modern square and contra dance style. This First Saturday of the month dance is held at Fulton Community Center, and starts at 7:30pm. For more information, contact Kate, 255-2226. Cost is \$2.50.

Stumptown Cloggers' Barn Dance occurs on the second Friday of the month on the old roller rink at Oaks Park. Mostly squares and a few contras, it is in a large room with a good floor, and usually features a Stumptown performance at the intermission. Cost \$3.50.

Second Saturday Contra Dance is the longest continuously running contra dance in the state. This dance is similar to the first Friday dance, maintaining this tradition's ongoingness. A beginners workshop is held at 7:30. Cost is \$3.50 for seniors and PCDC members, others \$4.50.

Portland Ceili Dance is "a gathering of friends" with lively Irish music, sometimes played by world famous musicians. Very aerobic dancing and a full barare only a few of the notable features of this Third Friday of the month dance, held at VFW Lodge 907. The basic steps are taught usually from 8 to 8:30, but the dance goes on until 1am. Cost is \$3.50 for Portland Ceili Society members, others \$4.50. You must be over 21 to enter.

Third Saturday Contra Dance is a dance series organized by Paul McCullough at Fulton Community Center, which is just off Barbur Blvd. The dances tend towards the challenging side, and a workshop is available at 7:15 for beginners. Cost is \$4.

Third Saturday Celtic, American and Scandinavian Dance is organized by Evergreen Folkways in Vancouver at the Marshall Recreation Center. The series concentrates on dances of an American or Celtic tradition (including Irish and Welsh). Sit-in musicians are encouraged. Cost is \$3.

Fourth Friday Square and Swing Dance. Rich Kuras and Ned Leager call squares and contras intermixed with swing and cajun dances at the St. John's Eagles Hall, on John street between Lombard and Ivanhoe. Cost is \$3.50.

PCDC's board has worked out a budget for the coming fiscal year that will cover the newsletter, administrative costs, subsidy of special events, weekends and workshops, extra scholarship money and special projects. March Board Meeting. Members of the board volunteered to help with a dance as a fund raiser for Hanford Awareness Week, which starts May 10th. In a policy change, it was decided that sit-in musicians will be admitted free to all PCDC dances. George and Heather were burglarized recently, losing instruments, stereo, and irreplacable tape recordings. Besides sponsoring a benefit dance for them, we will give them a cash donation to help replace the instruments, which were not insured. Craig Brandis is organizing a fifties dance and potluck. The Songs of the Sea concert had a great turnout. The \$100 loss will be split between PCDC and Portland Folklore Society. A callers and dancers workshop with Penn Fix has been set. Suttle Lake Weekend has a tentative schedule, and a projected cost of \$85 per person for Th-Su, \$70 for just the weekend. The Horseflies will put on a concert and dance with Warren Argo the second Saturday in July. Details are being worked on for a musicians workshop either Saturday or Sunday. The proposal for our fall Dusk to Dawn dance is a Nov 14th date (a regular second Saturday dance) at the Warner Grange, hopefully with Penn Fix. The new membership registration system is in place, and new dance balance sheets and contracts reflect the new pay policy. These forms will go into use in March. The travel expense policy of \$5 per 50 miles will be applied per car, but the number of cars will be negotiated as part of the contract.

April Board Meeting. The English workshop drew lots of people, but a pay dispute emphasized the need for written contracts. The benefit dance for George and Heather was a very special night, and a generous sum was raised for their new instruments. Despite a prior request, Roger Peacock persisted in calling some very long square dances. Several complaints were received. Penn Fix can't make the scheduled date for Dusk to Dawn dance, so callers will include Paul, Bob, and Luther Black (from Seattle). The budget will require 170 dancers to break even. A cook is needed for the Suttle Lake weekend, and Liz and Derek will provide Scottish dance music. A general membership meeting is being planned for June 7th at Laurelhurst Park. Bob suggested that PCDC take over sponsorship of a Halloween dance he has begun to organize. We will attempt to minimize contract hassles by minimizing the number of contracts for an event, typically one for the caller and one for the band. The number of guest caller spots will be limited to two, and a return date for contract verification will be added. Robert will keep a master calendar of callers, bands, sound, etc. PCDC will donate \$100 toward the folk floor at NW Folklife Festival. Expiration of existing board members' terms was resolved in anticipation of the upcoming board elections. Seven positions will be available. Lani Martin, Terri Walker and Jim Wrathall have expressed an interest in board membership. Applications for summer scholarships will be considered at the May board meeting. Robert will become the registered agent for Oregon non-profit incorporation. A new cash box containing \$80 was stolen from Monique's car. The task of obtaining tax-exempt status through CDSS is nearly complete. Only a few questions remain unanswered.
