Special events

PCDC's English Country Dance series returns to its monthly orbit on Labor Day Weekend. Last year's Playford Ball was a scintillating cap to a year of growth and refinement. Nothing is quite so sublime as gliding smiles rapt with eyes, cars tuned to live English dance music. Ranting aside, English dance is frequently more sedate, but certainly no less energetic than its contradance nephew. Its energy pulses through graceful motion that never stops, through stolen glances and sly smiles, and through the wonder of all dancing as one. Portland's own Newtonians release the melodies that make our transports possible, and we are fortunate indeed to have them. Come share the joy at Fulton Park, this month and throughout the year. No experience or partner is required and children are welcome.

Stumptown Cloggers Barn Dance also gets hot to trot this month. Displaced from the Oaks Park bingo parlor last spring, this fall series returns to its Second Friday berth but at a new location, Mt. Scott Park. Seattle's Suzanne Girardot headlines the first fete, which begins with a 7 pm potluck. Check out the hall, chomp a few, then dance 'till you're dizzy.

Suttle Lake Weekend sold out in record time this year (even certain tardy newsletter staff are on the waiting list), but we stragglers can wipe away the wistfulness by joining another celebration. The Portland Ceili Society begins their Third Friday series of Irish ceili dances at a new location, the basement room of the Melody Lane Ballroom, right across the street from what was the PPAA. Ceili dancing is a lot like contradancing, except with steps. The steps aren't hard or necessary to enjoy the dancing. Join the fun.

Lady of the Lake is both a dance week and a weekend. This eighth annual weekend, sponsored by the Spokane Folklore Society, is sure to be a sellout. In October you can meet Ralph Sweet, a Connecticut caller since 1947, author of three dance books and maker of the famous Sweetheart flutes and fifes. Also on the teaching staff are Toby Bennett, an expert at English clog from Nottingham, England; Cathy Dark, a ten year veteran at teaching swing dance; and Penn Fix, that gadabout and raconteur who's put Spokane on the Northwest contradance map. The musical side of the equation will be balanced by Pete Spicer, master contra-piano player and former Connecticutical, founder of the band Fiddleheads; Armin Barnett, violin maker and fiddler extraordiniare; Laurie Andres, the name to trust for tasty accordian; and the swing band Sweet Hominy, joined by boogey pianist Alan MacGill. PCDC's Annual Dusk to Dawn Dance will repeat its spectacular performance, returning on the Second Saturday of October to a traditional grange setting. Christy Keevil will make a special northwest appearance at the Redland Grange (see the map). For those of you who don't know him Christy the founder of our First Friday dance series, a charm, J New England caller whose instrumental musicality bursts through, whether on accordian, bassoon or Highland pipes. Parking is limited, so make plans now to share a ride with friends. We will be distributing car pooling signup sheets. A comp' to list of bands and callers will be made available as the event draws near. Bring something yummy to share at the midpoint potluck breakfast, then charge on through 'till we dance by the dawn's first glimmers, basking in the glow of that last, weary waltz.

East Ave Tavern has a great lineup in the week following the dawn dance. Utah Philips will grace its stage on Oct. 12. The following night finds Sandy Bradley and those Wonder-filled zealots of zaniness, Greg and Jere Canote. Friday, the 14th finds singer, songwriter Bill Staines at the platform. The 20th of the month will be the night to enjoy Ossian, one of the finest Scottish bands to tour our shores. Last but not least in Frankie Armstrong, musical companion of Roy Bailey and Leon Rosselson, whose rich English voice has graced many an album. At press time the date was not positive, but it will be either the 19th or the 21st of October. Check with the tav.

Wannadance Uptown fever strikes Seattle over the weekend of Oct. 28 this year. Held in town at the Mountaineers Hall, it will cover contras, southern dances, cajun, swing and clogging. Tod Whittemore returns with Rod Miller, bringing with them Nick Hawes for New England contras and squares. Fred Park will be on hand to teach southern squares, and maybe we can talk him into telling some stories. Millie Ortega returns from Minneapolis to teach cajun dances and jitterbug, and Sandy Silva will get you clogging, even if you have two left feet. This weekend will also feature a reunion of the Hurricane Ridgerunners, the cajun sounds of How's Bayou, and a costume dance on Saturday night. Portland country dance locations

The acronyms used for representing dance locations listed in the calendar are explained below.

Unless stated, all dances are open to everyone-experienced or not, with without partners, and feature live music. All dances are taught and children are admitted without charge. At any PCDC dance where sit-in musicians are encouraged to play, they will be admitted free.

PCDC First Friday Dance. This condance at MAC showcases local and regional callers and dance bands. Cost is \$3.50 for seniors and PCDC members, others \$4.50. If you'd like to call or book a band for this dance, please contact PCDC. Musicians are encouraged to sit in with the hired band, but will not be miked. A beginners workshop is held at 7:30.

PCDC First Saturday English Country Dance. English Country dance is a source of modern square and contra dance style. This dance is held at Fulton Community Center, and starts at 7:30 pm. For more information, contact Kate, 255-2226. Cost is \$2.50.

Synopsis of regular dances

Stumptown Cloggers' Barn Dance moves to Mt. Scott Park, still on the second Friday of the month. Comprising mostly squares with a few contradances, they usually feature a Stumptown performance at the intermission. Cost \$4.00.

Second Saturday Contra Dance is the longest continuously running contra dance in the state. This dance is similar to the first Friday dance, maintaining this tradition's ongoingness. A beginners workshop is held at 7:30. Cost is \$3.50 for seniors and PCDC members, others \$4.50.

Portland Ceili Society Dance is "a gathering of friends" with lively Irish music, frequently played by world famous musicians. Very aerobic dancing and a full bar are only a few of the notable features of this Third Friday of the month dance, held at the Melody Lane Ballroom. It starts at 8 pm and goes on until 1 am. Cost is \$3.50 for Portland

Ceili Society members, others \$4.50. You must be over 21 to enter.

Third Saturday Contra Dance is a dance series organized by Paul McCullough at Fulton Community Center, which is just off Barbur Blvd. The dances tend towards the challenging side, and a workshop is available at 7:15 for beginners. Cost is \$4.50.

Third Saturday Celtic, American and Scandinavian Dance continues in Vancouver at the Marshall Recreation Center. Organized by Evergreen Folkways, the series concentrates on dances of an American or Celtic tradition (including Irish and Welsh). Sit-in musicians are encouraged. Cost is \$3.

Fourth Saturday Contra Dance is another independent dance series, organized by Moggy Vanderkin. It is held at Fulton Park starting at 8 pm, and has a workshop for beginners starting at 7:15 pm. Cost is \$4.50.



July Board Meeting. Suttle Lake camp is full, at 106 dancers. Current budget includes a \$500 subsidy. A budget for the '88-89 English Country dance series was approved. This includes increased half and so 1 rental. A proposal to raise pay minimums to \$50 will be decided after we can analyze last year's dance costs. The board approved a Stumptown Cloggers proposal for a dance benefit on the 5th Saturday of October. In light of another monetary request from CDSS, we discussed the nature of our relationship with the national organization. Our converts will be voiced with Genny Shimer at Suttle Lake. Another discussion centered on providing opportunities for new callers and bands while maintaining attendence through consistent dance quality, two issues which seem to be at odds.

August Board Meeting. A year-end financial statement reveals PCDC's annual cash flow to be around \$29 000. The projected \$4,000 operating budget considered only net dance receipts. The Mt. Tabor picnic and the August First Friday dance were both successes, the latter actually breaking the minimums, unusual for a summer dance. Redland Grange is the current choice for the Dusk to Dawn dance, pending further investigation. Jim Howe has announced a weekend extravaganza for the spring. Analysis of dance receipts is still pending so pay policy discussion was deferred until Sept. Rick Allen resigned from the board. Deborah proposed establishing a "booking agent" to handle bookings as well as contracts for PCDC dances. No decision was reached, but the ensuing discussion brought the suggestion that PCDC establish its own phone number, mapped to whomever such a booking agent might be. Paul McCullough and Moggy Vanderkin will receive a year's PCDC membership as a small token of our thanks for their service on the board.
