George Marshall will call at the regular November Second Saturday dance. Then he and Ann will lead a beginning/intermediate swing dance class on Sunday while David and Nick will spill the beans on what it takes to play good dance music. Both workshops cost \$5 and will be held at the Sellwood Community Center. Finally, the quartet will remerge for a concert Sunday night at East Ave Tavern. November is certainly a special events month this year.

PCDC New Year's Bash. Once again Multnomah Art Center will be the place to be to welcome in the new year. Proceeds from this pick-up, potluck dessert and dance party will go to our musicians benefit fund, used to ease the bite of instrument loss and other musical catastrophes.

Synopsis of regular dances

Stumptown Cloggers' Barn Dance is now held at Mt. Scott Park on the second Friday of the month. Comprising mostly squares with a few contradances, they usually feature a Stumptown performance at the intermission. Cost \$4.00.

Second Saturday Contra Dance is the longest continuously running contra dance in the state. This dance is similar to the first Friday dance, maintaining this tradition's ongoingness. A beginners workshop is held at 7:30. Cost is \$3.50 for seniors and PCDC members, others \$4.50.

Portland Celli Society Dance is "a gathering of friends" with lively Irish music, frequently played by world famous musicians. Very aerobic dancing and a beer and wine bar are only a few of the notable features of this Third Friday of the month dance, held at the Melody Lane Ballroom. It starts at 8 pm and goes on until 1 am. Cost is \$3.50 for Portland

Ceili Society members, others \$4.50. You must be over 21 to enter.

Third Saturday Contra Dance is a dance series organized by Paul McCullough at Fulton Community Center, which is just off Barbur Blvd. The dances tend towards the challenging side, and a workshop is available at 7:15 for beginners. Cost is \$4.50.

Third Saturday Celtic, American and Scandinavian Dance continues in Vancouver at the Marshall Recreation Center. Organized by Evergreen Folkways, the series concentrates on dances of an American or Celtic tradition (including Irish and Welsh). Sit-in musicians are encouraged. Cost is \$3.

Fourth Saturday Contra Dance is another independent dance series, organized by Moggy Vanderkin. It is held at Fulton Park starting at 8 pm, and has a workshop for beginners starting at 7:15 pm. Cost is \$4.50.

September Board Meeting. Except for the Sept. 10th dance, the heat kept this month's dances small, so we either broke even or lost money. The board made some small adjustments for the Dawn dance and Scholarship dance. Deborah suggested replacing the current dance coordinator system with a centralized booking agent. As a trial Moggy and Deborah will serve as a booking committee from Jan to Jun, 1989. We are considering raising the minimum pay to \$50 for PCDC dances, pending an analysis of its financial effects. PCDC netted \$1175 from dances in fiscal 87/88. Richard Rogers resigned from the board. Moggy has been elected into his position. Bimonthly reconsideration of board meeting times was tabled until next month.

October Board Meeting. After fears of the financial risks revolving around Suttle Lake weekend, the board was pleased to hear that the weekend actually made about \$100. Some refunds have not yet been settled, so this may take up the slack. Analysis of dance receipts indicated that a \$50 minimum pay policy would reduce PCDC's net to \$535. We discussed whether PCDC needs to make anything on the dances, musicians' perceptions of the fairness of our pay policy, and alternate sources of revenue if we should raise the minimum. Considering our subsidy of workshops and the English dance series, the board decided to table this discussion for now. The board authorized a donation from the musicians' benefit fund for a local musician whose fiddle was stolen in a recent burglary.
