That's why I dance with beginners. Dancing with a beginner is a different kind of fun. It's not perfect. Predictable, it's not. But what excitement boils out of them! It's like holding a giggling tiger by the eyeballs. And I have never been more appreciated than when I have offered a

diplomatic "May I suggest something?" about technique to a beginning partner. I guess I dance at least three dances with beginners in an evening.

When you dance with a beginner, you might find out pretty quick that you don't know the next figure, that you don't give enough weight, or that you don't swing as smoothly as you thought. Or you might not. Some dancers take the opposite gender role for a challenge. The ultimate challenge is dancing with beginners.

# **Tony Saletan**

In anticipation of PCDC's annual Suttle Lake Dance & Music Weekend—to be held this year on September 18-20—Footnotes is highlighting the camp staff.

Tony Saletan is a Boston-area caller, choreographer and musician. For a decade he shared with Ted Sanella the weekly dance sponsored by Boston's Country Dance Society.

Tony has called from Boston to Beijing. He is currently seen on television in 20 states and overseas on "Let's All Sing," an educational series of music and dance for children.

Tony is the author of many popular contra- and square dances, including Summit Reel, Double Draydl, Amicable Settlement, Grand Beginning, New Home and Welcome Tonight. He currently has a Fund for the Arts grant for his work with the Folk Arts Center of New England on the choreography of contra and square dances. Tony was recently selected to choreograph a musical, "The Robber Bridegroom," based on a story by Eudora Welty. (The book and lyrics were written by Alfred Uhry, of "Driving Miss Daisy" fame.)

Tony is known not only for his calling and choreography, but also for his piano playing. His publicity photo suggests other, less savory, instrumental skills as well.

PCDC April Board Minutes. Dana Jensen & Molly Libby presented a report on the 1991-92 English Country Dance season. The English Dance netted \$7 for the year, making it one of PCDC's most profitable activities. After hearing this, the board members were ready to agree with virtually any proposal from the English Dance organizers. A high percentage of the English Dance attendees have been new dancers who do not return from month to month, leading to frustration for novice and experienced dancers alike, not to mention the callers. The English Dance committee is considering several new ideas to improve this situation during next year's season. PCDC's annual membership meeting and board elections will be held during the Second Saturday Dance, July 11. For the first time in memory, there seem to be more people interested in joining the board than there are available slots. Third-hand reports of grumbling from out of town musicians regarding PCDC's pay policies will be investigated by four board members.

PCDC June Board Minutes. The board agreed to subsidize next year's English Country Dance series for up to \$500, although the actual expected subsidy is less than \$150. Rik will supervise the coming elections. A new board chairperson will be elected at the July 27 board meeting, with Nan serving as acting chair between the general elections and the board meeting. The Second Saturday dance in October will be held at the Warner Grange, with a special dance workshop and potluck that afternoon. Results of pay-policy surveys indicated that Portland does not seem to be out of line, and that most musicians are satisfied with what they're getting. To the general relief of all, a motion was passed that PCDC pay policies not be discussed by the board for at least the next six months.
