Suttle Lake Preview—

Julie King, Derek Booth and Claude Ginsburg

In anticipation of PCDC's annual Suttle Lake Dance & Music Weekend—to be held this year on September 18-20—*Footnotes* is highlighting the camp staff.

Seattle's Claude Ginsburg, Derek Booth and Julie King first teamed up in the Spring of 1990 for a one-shot gig that was so much fun for themselves and the dancers that they have kept going. Julie and Claude also play as a duo, creating a unique and memorable sound that delights contradancers.

Derek Booth is a mainstay of Seattle's dance community. As a member of Salmonberry, he calls and plays the concertina for the longest-running contradance in Seattle. Salmonberry has just released a cassette of New England contradance music, recorded live at one of its dances.

Derek has been involved in contra music since 1973, when his housemates formed a band and needed a piano player. With only six months of childhood piano lessons, Derek seized the opportunity. Progressing from keys to buttons, he has maintained his chromatic roots on the English concertina.

Claude Ginsburg brings a varied musical background to contradancing. Beginning over thirty years ago with a rigorous classical violin method, he moved into acid rock and jazz fusion in the '70s. After a long flirtation with French and Irish folk music he discovered contradance in 1981 in San Diego and has been playing for dances ever since. His current interests include Argentine tango, klezmer, and Morris music. An experienced studio musician (specializing mainly in obscure artists), Claude has finally recorded his own solo album, "Contra... and Blue."

Julie King delights contradancers in Seattle and the Northwest with her dynamic piano style, eye-catching dance flyers and colorful earrings. For over a decade Julie has been plunking the keyboard in dance bands; she has played almost every contradance in the Northwest. Last year Julie made her East Coast debut, playing for contradances throughout New England, including Vermont's Champlain Valley Festival. In November 1991 Julie toured with fiddler Andrea Hoag and New England caller David Kaynor, playing from Corvallis to Vancouver, B.C.

Julie's waltz "Waiting for Snow" has been selected for the soon-to-be-published *Gems*, a collection of tunes and dances celebrating the 75th anniversary of the national Country Dance and Song Society. PCDC July Board Minutes. The first act of the newly-elected board was to elect a chairperson. Dave Hamlin was unanimously chosen. A new semi-official position of vice-chair was created and Darrell elected to it. There have been some problems with sound at recent dances; these have been pointed out to the sound people involved and seem to be working themselves out. Still, because there are problems each time a new sound person comes aboard, we will prepare a letter of expectations and suggestions for new sound people. Suttle Lake camp is almost full; the board approved an eighth work-scholarship position for a parking coordinator. The Hall Monitor supply seems to be dwindling; we need to add more teenage names to the list. The October Harvest Dance will be coordinated by Wendy and Kathy. We have the opportunity to host a special October dance with Childsplay and Tod Whittemore; because of the humongous size of the band we might lose as much as \$500 on the dance. After much discussion the board decided to take advantage of this unique chance, and came up with some ideas about co-sponsors that might help defray some of the expense—George will coordinate.
