Potluck at the break. 8 PM at BWT. Oh—the fourth Friday happens to be the 25th (remember Uncle Bob...).



Second Friday English Country Dance. At least a little experience advised. Nan Evans calls and coordinates. BWT, 8 pm, no beginner's workshop. \$4.



PCDC September Board Minutes. Planning for the Childsplay dance in October is going fine. Diana is arranging print and broadcast publicity, and will prepare a flyer for all the special October dances. Michele will organize the New Year's Eve Benefit Dance. Jackie Schwab's English music workshop will be paid by the attendees, with the balance of the \$175 to come from the Musicians' Scholarship Fund. Starting in November, each regular dance will include a special open slot for local callers and bands. The 1993 Ski-Dance Weekend will be held January 29-31, the Dean Kenty Scholarship Dance February 13, and the Dusk to Dawn Dance June 12. MAC is once again raising its rent; various alternative halls were discussed, but so far we have not found an adequate replacement. The board discussed the idea of PCDC buying its own sound system; the chief benefit would be that our dance expenses could be cut, with the difference going to raise musician/caller pay. However, there would be a lot of associated hassles, so no immediate actions are planned.
