Continuing the series of Fantastic Women Callers of the North, Suzanne Girardot will join us for PCDC's Second Saturday Dance, September 11. Just in case I-5 isn't getting enough wear and tear, Suzanne will bring along some of Seattle's hottest musicians to help her out. 8 PM at MAC.

The PCDC English Country Dance is still off for the summer, but there will be a planning meeting Sunday afternoon, September 12, to map out the coming year. If you have any suggestions or concerns, please join the discussion. Call Molly (503/234-6149) for directions.

The weekend of September 17-19 will find the bulk of Portland's contradancers at PCDC's Fall Dance & Music Weekend at Suttle Lake. There won't be any intown dance over the weekend, but some of the camp staff will stay in town afterwards for a special Tuesday Dance on September 21. Calling and playing will be Massachusetts' David Kaynor, joined on harmony

fiddle by his cousin **Van Kaynor**. (See inside for more about these two fantastic musicians.) Our own **Dave Goldman** will sit in on piano. 8 PM at MAC.

On October 1, the PCDC First Friday Dance welcomes back another favorite caller and band from across the border: Spokane's Dave Smith and the Traveling Lundburg Brothers (Jack Lindburg & Arvid Lundin). Hot stuff. 8 PM at MAC.

The PCDC English Country Dance finally returns on Saturday, October 2. For those of you who haven't tried it, English Country Dancing is a bit more elegant than contradancing, but with even more intense eye contact. (There are a few other technical distinctions between the two dance forms, but those can wait until our next lesson.) Aimed at parents and children of any age, these will be easy and fun dances in a variety of formations (you know—squares, circles, truncated icosahedra, etc). Suttle Lake Preview

David & Van Kaynor

In anticipation of PCDC's annual Suttle Lake Dance & Music Weekend—to be held this year on September 17-19—Footnotes is highlighting the camp staff.

David and Van Kaynor are Massachusetts natives making their Suttle Lake debut. David grew up in a rich musical environment of social harmony singing of Methodist hymns, old popular songs and barbershop quartets. He played trumpet and sang in glee clubs and choirs in grade school, took up the guitar in college, and finally found the fiddle in 1974. After an infamous and now little-discussed period of playing in bar bands, David became an official contradance musician (substituting for his cousin Van) in 1976. In the meantime, David had started calling in Greenfield, Mass. in 1970, saving the local community dance from dying out.

Van has been playing classical violin since the age of 8. By the mid-70's he had degenerated into a fiddle player for contra- and country dance bands. His bands have included the Fourgone Conclusions (with his father Ed, brother Cammy and cousin David), Spælimenninir (Nordic/New England ensemble of "Prairie Home Companion" fame), and Wild Asparagus.

Together, David and Van play fiddles with an interactive harmony style unique in the contra world.

Van and David have been on staff at just about every East Coast dance camp there is, plus Lady of the Lake in Idaho, Bear Hug in Montana, and various California camps. Not to mention events in Bulgaria, Sweden and Denmark.

In addition to American music and dance, both David and Van have danced, played, learned and taught at numerous workshops on Swedish music and dance. In the process they have made several trips to Sweden, and they often host Swedish visitors in the U.S.

At Suttle Lake, David and Van will be teaching Scandinavian couple dancing, as well as leading a workshop in playing Scandinavian music. They'll also call and play during the evening contradance parties. After the weekend ends, David and Van will be teaching and playing at the regular Monday night Portland Scandinavian dance, and at a special Tuesday night contradance.

culture in a multicultural environment. Mayonnaise music is simply a process of removing depth, uniqueness and any hint of truth or reality from a composition so that it will appeal to the "average majority audience with proper family values."

The Mayonnaise style was originally developed to protect us WASPs and fellow travelers from confusing harmonics and rhythms and to protect us from immoral feelings. Or even from feeling at all.

As a matter of academic interest our readers may wish to know that there is also a Mayonnaise style of dancing which can be, but does not have to be, danced to Mayonnaise music. Mayonnaise dancing is a broad term that covers Federation Squares, Competition Ballroom, some versions of triple-time swing, and other dance styles that ensure a minimum of sensual communication between the dancer, his partner and the music.

Of course, Professor Dance encourages Mayonnaise music and dance. A good example of Mayonnaise music is the new Professor Dance Jazz Band and Accordion Ensemble 8-track tape, which includes "I Don't Feel a Thing 'Cause I Ain't Got that Swing."

Dear Professor Dance—

I am a contradancer. I have never done any swing dancing. I have many friends who do swing dancing but they all have a mouth full of cavities.

Myself, I have a mouth full of healthy teeth. I am sure this is more than a coincidence.

I hope you can settle this. Does swing dancing cause tooth decay? Does contradancing prevent tooth decay? Would it be safe to swing dance if I brushed my teeth before each dance?

Dear Mouth Full—

You said a... well, that's too easy.

We are sorry to tell you that brushing your teeth before a swing dance will not help. The tooth decay you noticed in swing dancers is just one outward symptom of the inner decay caused by this dance of swingers. That's just one of the many maladies caused by excessive dancing. Ever notice how Cajun dancers tend to have one leg shorter than the other? They walk as if they were on a hill, giving them a slanted outlook on life.

How about contradancers? They tend to walk in lines or rows like those little birds on the beach. And they have short attention spans because they are always moving on to the next.

PCDC July Board Minutes. Retiring board members were thanked, new members were welcomed. Tyler will understudy Michele as booking agent, Darrell and Marianne will understudy Nan as treasurer. Dave was voted in for another term as chair. Barb accepted election as secretary. The Dawn Dance was mostly successful; we agreed that the mix of bands, including the novelty of Fiery Clockface, kept people happily there longer than sometimes in the past. Overall the dance lost \$490, due to higher expense than last year for bands, plus the portapotty rental. After Suttle Lake camp in September, there will be a special mid-week dance with camp staff. A thorough discussion was held regarding the PCDC English Country Dance. We reviewed the history of the English dance and PCDC. Options considered for this year included continuing to provide up to \$500 subsidy with no strings attached, providing the same or less money with much more direct involvement by the Board, or even dropping "PCDC" from the name of the dance, with or without financial assistance. The final consensus was to continue the current system of covering up to \$500 of expenses, without the Board getting directly involved in managing the dance series; Molly invited all interested PCDC members to a planning meeting September 12. Merilee then presented a proposal for a Family Dance on October 9, prior to the regular evening dance. Issues discussed included PCDC's role, if any, advertising expenses, hall and staff expenses, admission fees and policies. The final consensus was for PCDC to sponsor this event, leaving the details to Merilee. Rik's experiment of offering food at the July 10 dance proved uneventful. No one had any objection to repeating this; Rik will do so from time to time. Dave distributed a first look at the last two year's regular dance finances; they show a \$10,000 annual cash flow, with an overall profit (which PCDC spends on other events) of about \$300. A propos of the ongoing questions about dance pay policies, it was interesting to see that PCDC's average after-expense income at a regular dance last year was \$14, while the average band member pay was \$60 plus travel. Just before the meeting was adjourned, Jan made a well-received suggestion that we put out name tags at our dances.
