Points will be awarded for awkward positioning, timing challenges, creation of near-impossible transitions between figures, incorporation of dance styles and figures inappropriate to a contradance, figures which create chaos, and any other aspect of the dance which makes balancing a checkbook seem like fun.

## Announcement of a Historic Event

PORTLAND, Oregon — The Portland Country Dance Community (PCDC) broke new ground in dance camp history at its annual fall Dance & Music Weekend at Suttle Lake, Oregon, September 17-19, 1993. For the first time at any camp, unlimited *espresso* was available throughout the weekend.

Interested participants paid a small fee at the registration desk, and received a sticker to affix to their dance camp badge. Anyone with such a sticker could walk up to the espresso cart in the corner of the main dance hall at any time and order their favorite espresso drink.

(The espresso person did express some concern at the number of doubles consumed by some individuals over the course of the weekend. Our attempts to interview these individuals were unsuccessful, however, as they seemed unable to remain in any one spot for more than a few seconds.)

Out-of-town participants all agreed that dance camp espresso is an idea whose time has come. PCDC now expects an espresso trend to percolate through the nation's dance camps. PCDC also expects that before long everyone will believe that the trend began in Seattle—the Espresso Capitol of the United States, and also the only city in the Pacific Northwest known to most East Coasters. PCDC is therefore publicizing its coup in a probably futile gesture to establish that not only is there dance life between Seattle and San Francisco, but that Portland represents the avant garde of contradance culture.
