PCDC's First Friday Dance, November 3, will be a North by Northeast evening. Caller Ed Hall has been visiting Oregon a lot lately from his native New Hampshire. He's developed a following here for his smooth, flowing contras, taught with friendly efficiency. The evening's band will be Polar Express. Joining Sue Songer and Lanny Martin on fiddle, accordion and piano will be Juneau's Charli Meacham on fiddle, banjo, mandolin, and whatever other instruments she can cram onto the plane. 8 PM at Multnomah Art Center.

The PCDC First Saturday English Country Dance will feature two callers, as Molly Libby shares the spotlight with Ben Allbrandt. The Little Newts (Bill Martin, Nancy Martin, and Eric Swenson) will provide the beautiful music. Some of the dances will be chosen from the program of next week's English Ball. November 4, 8 PM at Fulton Community Center.

The new End of the Trail Contradance will celebrate its third month of existence on Friday, November 10. Featuring caller Ben Allbrandt and Portland's Twisted Shamrock, this Oregon City dance is exposing a whole new corner of our metropolitan area to contradancing. 8 PM at the Pioneer Community Center.

Saturday, November 11 will be a busy dance day and night. First, the PCDC Family Dance will welcome back caller (and Family Dance organizer) Merilee Karr. She's asked fiddle/mandolin/banjo/guitar virtuoso Clyde Curley to sit in with some of his friends. We'll see whether they can match the energy level of a roomful of grinning children and out-of-breath parents. 5 PM at MAC.

Then come to a **Potluck Dinner** before the evening's festivities begin. Bring any sort of food or drink, and spend some time meeting those people you've been dancing with all these months. 7 PM at MAC.

Finally, let's hope that I-5 is clear south of us, as the PCDC Second Saturday Dance hosts a caller from Roseburg and a band from Eugene. Woody Lane, our fantastic clogging teacher at the Suttle Lake weekend, is an equally fantastic caller who always picks great contradances. He might also throw in one or two fast-moving squares. (Woody holds the record for successfully teaching the most complex square-dance move—the Teacup Chain—in the shortest time—under five minutes—to the biggest crowd of beginners in the

Northwest—the Folklife Festival.) Joining him on-stage will be contra/Scottish/English fiddler extraordinaire Linda Danielson, player of anything with strings Chico Schwall, and blower of any instrument with a hole in one end Fred Wilson. 8 PM at MAC.

This is a Big Event, with dancers driving and flying in from Washington, California, and who knows where else. There's a workshop in the afternoon, and the main shindig starts at 7:30 PM. Seattle Weekend Dance Festival and Workshops

The entire weekend package, including two catered lunches Saturday and Sunday, costs \$80, or



Everything About Dancing That Nobody Ever Talks About

Part 1 of 3

Ask a caller about "partner interactions" and they'll start talking about allemandes and swings, eye contact and giving weight. But a lot of partner interactions in the dance hall have little to do with dancing, and beginning dancers seldom hear these issues discussed during dance workshops. For that matter, some of these topics are almost never discussed by any of us.

When you fill a room with a hundred people of both genders, a wide range of behaviors will result. Some of these behaviors will surprise a newcomer, but seem perfectly appropriate to experienced contra-dancers. Others exceed the bounds of appropriateness, but go unchallenged because the victim is unsure of what's considered normal in this community, or doesn't know how to react. In *rare* cases, the perpetrator may not even be aware of his or her error.

This series of articles borrows from some recent discussions on the Internet, as well as from scattered conversations over the past several years at dances, parties, and camps. Our goal is to stimulate more open discussion of these issues within our community. *Footnotes* welcomes your responses—in our future issues we'll devote space to your letters.

[Note: for syntactical and statistical reasons, we usually refer below to perpetrators of inappropriate behavior as "he", and their victims as

"she." We look forward to hearing your anecdotes of events where the genders sorted out otherwise.]

Look and Feel

Something that you do hear mentioned at dance workshops is *eye contact*. Contradancers definitely like to look into each other's eyes, a practice that can be unnerving for newcomers.

Some people maintain major eye contact because they've found it keeps them from getting dizzy during swings and quick allemandes. But most of us also enjoy looking into our partner's eyes as one part of the friendliness of contradancing.

The next step up from being friendly is *flirting*. This behavior, too, is an established contradance tradition. But flirting is a two-lane highway—it's not appropriate for you to be racing along at sixty if your partner has chosen to remain idling at the curb. And making your partner uncomfortable by outright *leering* is definitely *not* within acceptable bounds.

One ocular behavior that we shouldn't need to mention as inappropriate—but which, apparently, we must—is staring down a woman's dress. Please remember that the tradition here is eye-to-eye contact.

Which leads directly to a topic of recent fervor in the Internet's rec.folk-dancing discussion group, the contact of women's breasts by their partners.

Surprisingly, there is a spectrum of behaviors even here. Not infrequently during a swing or waltz, an inexperienced female dancer will turn away from her partner in such a way that his right arm is forced across her chest. Or her left arm will press down on his right, squeezing it against the side of her breast.

On the other hand, there are some experienced male dancers who frequently manage to force their partner into one of these positions. Women should not dismiss these men as merely clumsy.

Then there are the totally-accidental contacts when one partner or the other is coming out of a wild allemande or spin. These can happen very occasionally to anyone, and are probably best handled by an appropriately sheepish expression.

But there are a few men who seem to have a *lot* of these accidents. This exceeds the bounds of probability, sheepish looks or no.

Something that didn't come up on rec.folk-dancing was derriere groping. (Well, actually one club square-dancer did describe a local trend of butt-patting with a certain dance figure.) But looking at our tradition, the position of the woman's right hand on a courtesy turn does seem defensive. Which is not to say that there aren't many times when it's appropriate for a man's hand to land on his partner's waist. Lower than that, though, is by mutual consent only.

Defense

If you find yourself the recipient of unwanted ophthalmic or tactile attention, you have available a range of appropriate reactions. The most common is to ignore what just happened. Unfortunately, this does nothing to prevent a recurrence of the behavior, to yourself or to others.

At the very least, *note* who has just done something inappropriate. Then you can defend yourself in the future, whether by refusing to dance with that person or by being on guard next time you see him coming down the contra line.

It is certainly appropriate to point out to someone that they've done something you found uncomfortable. You may have the chance to speak to a partner right away, even as the dance continues. Or you can take him aside at the end of the dance, or seek him out later in the evening. If this is one of those situations where the perpetrator actually was unaware of his actions, then your words may end up benefiting the entire community. And even if he was fully aware of what he was doing, being told that his behavior has been noted may discourage its repetition.

One reaction that one woman suggested in the Internet discussion, but that we have never witnessed in practice, is to emit a loud, outraged exclamation or shriek immediately upon an unwanted touch. This does indeed seem like a potentially effective maneuver.

Don't forget that we are a dance *community*. If you identify a person who routinely behaves inappropriately, share this information with other dancers. This will help others defend themselves.

Finally, you can speak to the dance organizers—in the case of a PCDC event, that means any of the Board members. This does put the organizers in a somewhat awkward position, and one for which there has been little precedent. Still, a dance organizer should feel sufficiently empowered to walk up to a dancer and quietly inform him that there have been reports of certain specific behaviors that have made other dancers uncomfortable. There is no need for the "accused" to "face his accuser," or for any sort of adversarial confrontation. The goal is not to determine guilt or innocence, but simply to allow us to all dance together happily in one room.

First Saturday Cats & Dogs Contradance. Moondog and various Cat bands alternate months with guest callers. SAC, 8 pm, beginners' workshop 7:30 pm. \$5.

Second Friday End of the Trail Contradance. Ben Allbrandt and Twisted Shamrock, in Oregon City. PC, 8 pm, beginners' workshop 7:30 pm. \$5. Second Friday English Country Dance. At least a little experience advised. Nan Evans calls and coordinates. BWT, 8 pm, no beginner's workshop. \$5.
