Dancing With Beginners

Beginners. You know, the ones with the grip of a lumber jack or a hand like a limp rag? They are easily spotted—confused, off the beat, wiped out after the first

dance, and wearing the wrong attire. Many of us with "Center Line Syndrome" avoid dancing with beginners; i- we dance around them.

But we all were beginners once. Becoming a good dancer takes persistence, courage and constructive help. Some experienced dancers try to dance with at least one beginner an evening. We have danced in other cities and attended dance camps and workshops, and know that a dance community benefits from having each member well-instructed in dance techniques.

Not everyone is outgoing—many beginners are too shy to ask experienced dancers to dance. Beginners often stick together out of intimidation, or don't come back, or mimic the poor habits of other unschooled dancers.

When you take time to help a beginner you help create and maintain a satisfying dance experience for everyone. If you are uncertain how to do this, remember praise and encouragement can open a positive channel for constructive feedback. Genuine interest in beginners and a willingness to help without judgment puts everyone at ease. Here are some tips:

- Come early to help with the pre-dance class. Be bold enough to split up beginning couples. Offer to dance the first contra with a beginner.
- If you miss the workshop, check out the beginners during the first dance. You often can tell who has enthusiasm and is responsive to a little hint in passing. Those beginners may be glad to receive some guidance from you in the next dance.
- Encourage them by saying something like "I noticed you really seemed to enjoy this even though you got lost several times. It gets easier." Or "For a beginner, you have a good sense of the beat." Or "I really appreciated your sense of giving weight." Or "Most beginners have trouble with those things." Be honest, of course.
- After the dance, encourage them to come back. Then offer advice about just one thing to avoid overwhelming them: "May I offer a suggestion that could help?" Find something you can demonstrate, such as how to give weight. How to balance. How to do a ladies' chain. Where to place your hands and arms in a swing.
- Encourage them to either observe or ask other experienced dancers to dance, and point out a few.
- Check in with that person in the second half of the dance to see how he or she is doing. A follow-up dance is often nice.

Yes, it's only May now, but it's not too soon to start planning for PCDC's 1996 Fall Dance & Music Weekend at Suttle Lake. This year will feature contradance led by Vermont's Susan Kevra, and waltz, hambo and zweifacher taught by Seattle's Art Hare. The music is similarly bicoastal, with New England donating BLT (Peter Barnes, Mary Lea, Bill Tomczak), while Puget Sound contributes Laurie Andres, Cathie Whitesides, and Sandy Bradley.

Applications will be going out at the start of June. This year we're trying something new—a lottery. All applications postmarked by July 15 will be placed into a suitable container, from which a drawing will determine who gets into camp and who gets placed onto the waiting list. Hopefully this will mean that women can avoid the stress of having to get their applications in instantaneously, before the women's list fills. And maybe a few more men will apply before mid-August.

(Because we do try to keep the camp somewhat gender-balanced, and because you can apply as individuals or as couples, the details of the lottery are a bit complex. We won't go into all the algebra here, but if your curiosity knows no

bounds you can ask the camp registrar, Dave Goldman, for elaboration. Please provide your own blackboard.)

As in past years, a limited number of work scholarships will be available. In exchange for your helping the kitchen staff throughout the weekend and taking on some extra responsibilities during camp clean up, you will receive a \$50 rebate from your camp payment. So if finances might otherwise keep you away from camp be sure to check the work scholarship box on your application.

Suttle Lake Staff Preview




In four short years, Brattleboro's Susan Kevra has established herself as one of New England's most sought-after callers. Known for her warm and inviting style of dance leadership, Susan has appeared at numerous dance festivals, camps and events across the country-including Pinewoods, Ashokan, Lady of the Lake, John C. Campbell Folk School, Old Songs Festival and the Ralph Page Legacy Weekend. Susan's repertoire includes a full range of old and new contras and squares from New En-

gland and beyond. Meanwhile, her own contras—such as the notorious Trip to Phan Reel—are spreading through the country. At Suttle, Susan will be leading contradances and sharing style pointers.

BLT has been playing for contra, English, vintage, and assorted other dances since the early '80s. The band consists of three of New England's best-known and most versatile musicians, each of whom has played at more festivals and camps than we can begin to mention, and all of whom have scads of recordings to their credit.

Peter Barnes (piano and flute) is kept busy almost every evening in Boston's vibrant dance scene, where he is also a member of such bands as Yankee Ingenuity, Bare Necessities, and Childsplay. Another member of those three bands is Mary Lea (fiddle), who has also played and toured with Wild Asparagus. As has Bill Tomczak (clarinet and saxophone), whose career has also taken Balkan and Klezmer side trips. At Suttle, BLT will be playing for both contra and couple dancing.
