Dance All Night At Dusk to Dawn

Dusk to Dawn Dance

PCDC kicks off its annual Dusk to Dawn dance June 9 at the Kinton Grange at 8 p.m. The dance will last until about 5:30 a.m. June 10. To get to the Grange, go west on Scholl's Ferry Road, past Washington Square, approximately five miles west of Hwy. 217. The grange is on the right; you can't miss it.

There will be an ongoing potluck through the night for energy. Please bring hearty foods in addition to dessert-type stuff. Juices are welcome, too. Coffee will be provided.

If you bring a water bottle, please have your name on it; we can't take water bottles into the dance hall and are asked to leave them in the vestibule.

Parking at the Grange is extremely limited. Please carpool and follow the directions of the parking attendants when you arrive.

The Annual Membership Meeting will be held during the evening to vote on new board members. See any of the board members listed on the back page if you would like to serve on the board, or nominate someone else.

We have ended the event with as many as 40 people still dancing. See if you can be one of the last survivors.

Here is the lineup for the dance:

The Nettles with Warren Argo

The hot Corvallis band The Nettles is comprised of Laura Brophy on fiddle, Coleen Dick on penny whistle and uillean pipes, Kevin Johnsrude on guitar and electric bass and Sid Cottrell on percussion. The band's driving rhythms breathe new energy into the dancers, and its creative improvisations give new life to old Irish and American tunes.

Seattle caller Warren Argo always brings warmth and humor to any dance, whether he is playing an instrument, calling, providing sound or dancing.

Big Table with Woody Lane

Big Table is a band that features prominent players from both the Southern and Northern dance music traditions. From this blend emerges a strong rhythmic groove over which the fiddle and accordion dance together.

The Chicago Tribune called fiddler Judy Hyman's playing with the Horse Flies "haunting" and the band "glove-tight." Judy joined pop star Natalie Merchant's band on the Summer 2000 Tour. Vermont accordionist and pianist Jeremiah McLane also plays with the exciting, versatile Clayfoot Strutters and Nightingale, a band whose music ranges from thrilling to haunting. Jeff Claus on banjo and uke is also a member of the Horse Flies, about whom

Rolling Stone wrote, "A band that's earned a buzz" and Musician Magazine called "good players dedicated to a punchy, coherent band groove." Boston area guitarist Larry Unger has been a full-time musician in high demand for 15 years, playing for contra dances across the country with Uncle Gizmo, Reckless Abandon, Scottish fiddler Elke Baker and many others. He has published two tunebooks and released several CDs including "Waltztime," a collection of his original waltzes. June Drucker on bass is known in the old time music scene for her bass playing with the Heartbeats. Through the years, she has garnered great respect for her skillful, sensitive, solid bass playing.

Roseburg Caller Woody Lane has called contras and squares in the Pacific Northwest and across the country for more than 15 years. Besides his smooth contras and fast squares, Woody adds percussive spice as he clogs to the music.

Flashpoint With Dave Smith

The newly-formed band consisting of long-time Portland favorites Dave Goldman on piano, Kathleen Towers on fiddle and Dave Smith on percussion and calling, is bound to keep your late-night dance energy up.

Dan Compton, Landon Kuhn, Fred Nussbaum and Fran Slefer with Maureen Collier

This group will play a selection of electric instruments into the wee hours of the morning. Fred Nussbaum on electric cello will join Dan Compton on guitar and fiddle. Dan is also a member of Jigsaw and is deeply involved with Irish music up and down the I-5 corridor. Dan's interest in the musical styles of Ireland, Quebec and Appalachia are often reflected in the countless tunes he has written. Fran Slefer, on accordion and keyboard, and who hails from Ireland, plays fiddle as well. Her fine style is indicative of her many years of learning and playing Irish music. College-age fiddler Landon Kuhn is a dynamic musician who was raised around the folk music community by his folks Michael and Susan Kuhn. We hope to hear a lot more from him in the future.

From Vancouver, B.C., Maureen Collier delights dancers on stage and off with her good humour and spirited energy. Maureen works to create magic moments where the music and the figures fuse to propel the dancers. Maureen has been calling on both sides of the border since 1996, including the September 2000 Chehalis dance camp. This will be part of Maureen's first calling visit to Oregon. After warming up earlier that night in Eugene, she hopes to provide scintillating dances for your pre-dawn delight.

Cascadia Folk Quartet With Sherry Nevins

The Cascadia Folk Quartet is known throughout the Pacific Northwest for its outstanding musicianship and affable humor. Several members are alumni of the popular band Whammadiddle Dingbats! These veteran entertainers charm the audience with their warm and energetic stage presence. The band consists of Chip Cohen on fiddle, vocals, bass and guitar; Mick Doherty on hammer dulcimer and bases; and Kevin Shay Johnson, a.k.a. Slim, who has been singing and playing folk music in the Portland area for 20 years.

Seattle caller Sherry Nevins has called contra dances in the Seattle area since 1980, and traditional square dances since 1977. She enjoys teaching couple dance workshops (waltz, polka, and swing), and calling and dancing at family-oriented events. She began coordinating community dances in Seattle in 1979. She has taught at Camp Wannadance, Pinewoods, Chehalis, Bear Hug, Let's Dance, Suttle Lake, and the Gualala and Lady of the Lake Family Weeks.

Clyde Curley, Betsy Branch and Sue Songer With Dave Smith

Clyde Curley on mandolin, octave mandolin, fiddle and banjo, has been a musical presence in the Pacific Northwest for 30 years, bringing energy and versatility to bands like the Highwater String Band, the Backstairs Band, Jigsaw and the Rose City Aces. Clyde provides a fluid and powerful delivery on any instrument. Sue Songer is a member of the band Feline Groovy and various other "cats" bands. She has also played for English country dances and provides tireless energy towards the organization of the Megaband. Sue and Clyde produced the tune book "The Portland Collection" in 1997 which has led to the release of a new CD with Clyde, Sue and George Penk entitled "A Portland Selection." Portland Fiddler Betsy Branch's music reflects an eclectic mix of Irish, old time, English, jazz, swing, gospel and classical-which creates a wild and very dancable sound. Betsy started playing the violin at age 5, and started fiddling in 1994. She's played in a number of dance bands in Seattle, the Bay Area and in Portland. Betsy is a violin and fiddle teacher

in Portland, but every summer she returns to the Bay Area to teach at a kids camp called "Fiddlekids,"

Portland caller Dave Smith's dynamic calling is peppered with frenzy-producing percussion played on various instruments. Dave has been calling since the 1980s on both coasts. Dave recently formed a band with pianist Dave Goldman and fiddler Kathleen Towers called Flashpoint, in which he plays several percussive instruments. Dave will be on the staff of the Montana Bear Hug Mountain Festival this September with Reckless Abandon.

East Coast caller and fiddler David Kaynor has made several visits to Sweden, where he has presented music and dances from the Connecticut River Valley. Music has always been an important part of David's life, as he played piano and trumpet and sang in school choirs and ensembles. His father took him to his first square dance when he was 8 or 9 years old. In college, he began playing guitar and singing folk songs, eventually touring the southern Maine coast and northern Vermont in the mid-1970s. He has played in country-rock bar bands, string bands and contra dance bands.

Gradually, David became involved in larger regional and national contra dance scenes. He has spent 18 consecutive years on staff at Northern Week at Ashokan and six consecutive year on staff at Contra Dance Musicians' Week at the John C. Campbell Folk School in Brasstown, North Carolina.

Cellist Fred Nussbaum was one of the founding members of the Portland Baroque Orchestra. Dave Goldman on piano is a member of UnLeashed!, and provides great energy to the dances. George Penk's fiddle always provides a driving rhythm at any dance. George and Fred are also members of the band Full Circle.
