## **PCDC Weekly English Dance Series Celebrates First Year**

Every Friday night at 7:30 p.m., dancers congregate at the Burlingame Water Tower (BWT) for the PCDC English dance. September celebrates the first anniversary of the successful weekly dance series.

A year ago, when BWT became available every Friday night, a group of dancers approached the PCDC board with a proposal to merge Nan Evan's semi-monthly dance with the monthly PCDC English dance, and add additional dances to create the weekly PCDC dance series. The board agreed, and the dance series has been a wonderful success.

With PCDC support, advertising, and the dance becoming a weekly series, attendance at the dance has nearly doubled from a year ago. Many dancers—new and experienced—are finding the joys of English dancing.

English dance encompasses a wide variety of dance formations and styles of music. As with contra dancing, the most common formation is a longways set. Other formations include squares, 2, 3 and 4 couple longways sets, circles and Sicilian circles (couple facing couple around a circle).

Elegant and smooth dances are "Playford" or "Playford-style" dances. These are dances that John Playford published, starting in 1650, or dances that have been composed more recently in a similar style.

If you have watched "Pride and Prejudice" on PBS, you have seen examples of the Playford dances. Traditional dances tend to be more energetic, and use polka, rants, swings and promenades. Both of these styles of English

dance were brought to the United States in colonial times, and evolved into the modern contra dance.

The music used for English is rich, melodic and varied: tunes used range from popular folk songs, broadsides and ballads of the day, to pieces by Purcell and Grainger. Dance tunes also include waltzes, reels, jigs and slip jigs, and modern compositions.

The relationship between music and dance in English dancing is very important. Each dance has its own special tune, and the figures of the dance precisely fit the phrase of the music. Dancers have been known to say, "I learned to love dancing doing contras, and I learned the importance of timing doing English."

At the weekly series, the dancing starts at 7:30 p.m., with simpler dances to introduce the basics, and those basics are built upon for the rest of the evening. The dance environment is open and welcoming. Tea and cookies are served at the break, where dancers, musicians and callers mingle and get to know each other.

What's next for the English dance series? The callers and musicians are continuing to work with each other to provide a great evening of dance for new and experienced participants. The PCDC Ball weekend is November 1 to 3 (See article below).

PCDC is looking forward to seeing the weekly dance series continue to grow and expand. Come find out what the English dance is all about!

See you on the dance floor.

Barbara—queen of harmony—was a founding member of the Good Old Persons, a seminal progressive bluegrass band in the '70s. She played with the Arkansas Sheiks, and accompanied famed Irish accordion virtuoso Kevin Keegan, before discovering the rhythmic and harmonically rich Quebecois piano style, on which her current accompaniment is based. She also wrote a chapter in a book on how to play the spoons.

PCDC Board Meeting, July 23, 2002. Board members present: Ron Bekey, Mary Olsen, Kaye Blesener, Eliza Romick, John Coon, Betty Woerner, Hank Laramee, Cindy Workman, Dave Macemon, Ken Yates. Next meeting: September 10, 2002, at Dave Macemon's home. Scholarships: Approved scholarships to the following: Eliza Romick, Gail Sittser, Lori Shaffer. Other: The board agreed any guest presentations at board meetings should provide advanced notice to ensure board members are prepared. PCDC contra dances at FCC: The board discussed sneak-ins, hand stamps, and the dollar-off coupons. PCDC will stop issuing dollar-off coupons, but honor those coming in. Dancers arriving prior to 7:30 will get a dollar off the entrance fee. Financial report: Overall net income for the two months showed a small loss. The English country dance has a positive cash-flow since it began last year. They plan to prorate shares for musicians based on last year's net. To simplify book keeping and tax reporting, they will change their fiscal year to the same as that used for the rest of the finances (July 1 through June 30). Issues for next meeting: Review of new scholarship policy; Challenge contras; Newsletter writer; Marketing/membership board position; Benefits of discounts and discount coupons at dances; Use of hand stamps or other means of marking at special dances; Consider changes to Dusk to Dawn Dance; Money for out of town bands; Improving current physical facilities for dances; Vision for future dance venues (e.g., combine with other dance groups to rent/purchase a hall).
