Gender-Free Generatiợn

Gender-Free? Is that one of them new organic food labels? No, it's not an FDA label letting you know you are federally protected from some harmful substance, but it does identify an ingredient we don't often think about: the role gender plays in why dance. Ultimately, I want to define the purpose of a 'gender-free dance.'

When I first started working on this event with PCDC, I around for some opinions on the matter, and, not surprisingly, some folks said, "Ah, that's just those young people who don't know themselves forcing me to change some terms that don't mean anything." This might sound like a generational divide...because it is. But I want to honor the underlying fear/push-back from this kind of statement. Every generation, every person, wants to feel comfortable and accepted in their identity of self. To have someone tell you you've gotten your ideas of gender wrong your whole life, and without even having a conversation with you, well, that's just plain mean. Why, you'd never do such a thing...would you?

After all, providing a safe place for anyone to be themselves and share in the joy of contra dance is one of our most cherished talking points in dance evangelism, right?

Enter, the gender-free dance (which we still haven't defined). Some folks might define a gender-free dance as one that is "gay friendly." But a more accurate description would be a dance intending to cultivate a safe space for all people – specifically to be more open to queer and trans community members, whom we love and who may have stopped coming to dances.

But neither is what I believe defines a gender-free dance. A gender-free dance should address why folks feel left out of our community promise. And just saying, "hey, we are LGBTQ friendly tonight" doesn't make it so. So, why is it that folks are drawn to gender-free dances all across the country?

Let me start by saying thank you to everyone who shared their experience, insights and, often, strong opinions. The two main themes that arose out of my conversations were: 1) We have been saying "guys can dance with guys," and "girls can dance with girls," for a while now but, really, we've been modeling "girls dance with girls because they have to, and guys dancing with guys is gross." And, 2) The reasons why different people contra dance don't always match.

Number one is clearly hurtful and is easy enough to fix by simply honoring the choices of our community members to be and play whatever role they choose. That way we are upholding our values of openness, as well as being welcoming as a dance community. We can change terms or not, redefine terms to mean what we want them to (that (continued on page 3)



CDSS Centennial Tours

In celebration of its centennial, the Country Dance & Song Society (parent organization of PCDC) has been sending teams of musicians and callers to communities all across North America for the purpose of boosting local interest in music and dance and empowering the community to continue on its own after the team has left.

Many communities applied to host these teams – seven were chosen. Portland's Betsy Branch and Sue Songer will be part of a team that will be traveling to Halifax, Nova Scotia during the latter part of September. (Others on this team are Lisa Greenleaf, Sue Hulsether, and Eric McDonald – all from other parts of the US.) The team will have a full seven-day schedule, working both in the schools during the day, and with adult dancers and

musicians evenings and weekends. Sue says: "By the end of the week, hopefully some of the wonderful enthusiasm for music and dance here in Portland will have been implanted all the way across the continent."

Meanwhile, back on the Left Coast, world-renowned caller and dance educator Bob Dalsemer along with the mothers-and-daughters singing Appalachian stringband Firefly—all from North Carolina—will be dispatched to

Coos Bay, Oregon to teach, dance, sing and play with the locals from October 4-10. There will be workshops for dancers, callers, organizers and musicians; square

dances; contra dances; song circles and concerts. All events are free and open to the public. From the South Coast Folk Society: "We're looking forward to this week for building the skills of our local musicians, dancers and singers; strengthening the activities of our folk society; and



throwing a fabulous week-long party!" The media will be there too as Seattle-based photographer and videographer Doug Plummer is in the process of making a documentary about contra dancing in Coos Bay and the South Coast community. Says Doug: "Can a dance change a town? That is the goal of a group of dance organizers and musicians in Coos Bay, Oregon, a working class lumber town [in] transition to a new economy." is another conversation), face our own phobias (yet another conversation), but ultimately, honoring however someone has chosen to dance clearly falls at the center of accepting community members free of gender. That's step one.

Number two was much more surprising. Thank you again to all the folks who were open in our conversations. I had many conversations with folks around the disappointment they feel, and the glaze that comes over their eyes, when dancing with the fourth same gender person in the line. I thought this was straight up queer/ trans phobia, but it is not. That exists for some, but there were a number of "older" friends and community members who shared an insight I hadn't even considered.

"I like dancing with guys (girls) from time to time, in the line, but I come to flirt with women (or men). That is the reason I dance. If I only dance with guys (girls) in an evening, it wasn't worth it for me." Some younger folks might balk, but those are the same folks who will grow old, say young people just don't understand how to live and then not understand why said young people look at them funny. It's true! Flirting with your desired sex/gender is one of the primary reasons our dance form exists — to have fun as a community, celebrating the joy of dance together, but also to meet partners, friends and lovers.

The difference for most younger folks, especially where the generational divide is greater, is that they don't dance just to flirt or find partnership. Sure, a bit, but that is what blues or swing or tango is for. In contra, they dance more often just to dance with everyone (or their friends) – to be themselves (awkwardness and all) and have fun with the whole community. It isn't a more noble reason than any other – we all dance for this reason too – it is just a different major focus. As a consequence, younger folks aren't going to feel welcome when us "older" folks give them the stink-eye for "confusing the line with their gender bending."

So, what does all this mean for defining a gender-free dance?

Well, gender-free is not just about the terms we use to include folks who don't identify as male or female, and it is not just about being more open and welcoming to everyone regardless of sexual or gender identity. Gender-free dances are about cultivating one of our primary reasons for dancing, the reason that will draw our next generation of dancers — to enjoy the whole of the community first and other reasons after.

I'll leave you with a quote from someone who came specifically because they had fallen in love with our dance community, someone who hadn't been dancing for a long time and articulated the draw for the next generation:

"For me, I feel this sense of community, togetherness, learning to laugh about mistakes. I see friends and strangers alike coming together to experience something so basic and yet profound that has been lost in the larger culture. For me, it is a joyful celebration of the human experience, and my hope is that everyone who wants to participate feels welcomed with open arms and big smiles, invitations to dance, and language that includes them."

Contra Committee: There will be a contra dance on Dec. 26. The New Year's Dance will be held at Norse Hall on January 2, 2016. The band will be Gallimaufry. Since attendance at Fulton dances is light during the summer, it was suggested that smaller bands (2-3 pieces) be booked to reduce expenses. The committee is evaluating the gender-free dance held recently and is working on a letter to callers regarding inclusive terminology.

Raindance: Bands will be Hotpoint and Clew Bay with Rick Mohr and Deb Comly calling. Dates are April 22-24. The Raindance Committee now consists of Kim and Christine Appleberry, Greg Jackson, and Rick Kimball.

NW Passage: Registration is proceeding and camp will likely fill up. Rich Scher and Ethel Gullette have joined the NW Passage Committee.

Grants: Several grants have been issued for various events, including NW Passage.

Membership: Current membership total is just over 210.

CDSS centennial celebration: The possibility of a silent auction during the CDSS fundraiser contra dance on October 10 was discussed.

Outreach: Event cards are being designed to distribute at colleges, etc. Christine suggested that a flyer for the activities racks at local hotels might be a good thing.

New business: Approved Christine Appleberry and Noah Grunzweig as board members and representatives from the Raindance and Contra Committees respectively.

There was a discussion regarding the most costeffective way to distribute *Footnotes*, the PCDC newsletter. Christine reported that, in order to use our bulk mail permit, more copies need to be printed than are actually distributed. Many members prefer electronic delivery/notification of the newsletter. It may be best to let the permit lapse and use stamps for a reduced number of newsletters. Mike will look into cancelling the permit and getting a refund of any funds left in the account.



Footnotes is distributed to members of PCDC and to other folk organizations.
