President's Corner: New Community Grant Program

Got a great idea for a dance or music event but need some funds to get it going? Is an amazing musician coming to town for a concert and you'd love to have them lead a workshop? Dreaming about a program that could make our organization better? Been to another dance community and experienced something amazing that you'd like to bring here?

PCDC may be able to help. Our board recently adopted a new Community Grants Policy that makes funding available to members for events and other activities that would benefit our community. The grants can provide opportunities for folks to learn and improve skills or to experience something special that isn't currently available.

Why are we doing this? Our committees are very busy with our regular dance series, special dances, and weekend camps. We don't have the bandwidth for other events, but still want to meet the ever-changing needs of our community. We know that our members have great ideas, contacts, and passion for organizing other programs and events, and we want to jump-start that process by providing funds for those initiatives.

So what can community grants help do?

- Create new participatory music and dance events and workshops, including series, weekends, and week-long programs
- Boost existing participatory series or events
- Train callers, musicians, dancers, sound techs, and organizers
- Encourage involvement of those under 30 years old
- Publish instructional materials (print, web, audio, video)
- Start related endeavors that will have a lasting positive outcome for our dance and music community

Community grant applicants must submit an application, acknowledge PCDC support in publicity and at the event, and provide a follow-up report. Bringing the deep drive of dance music to every performance, their arrangements blend both traditional and modern influences with astounding musicianship and fluency. Countercurrent is a genre-bending experience rooted firmly in the traditional music of the Celtic Isles and America: music that lifts you up and charges fearlessly into the future of folk music.

George Marshall (Western Massachusetts) has been calling dances since 1978. He shares his passion for contra dance while touring nationally as well as internationally. George's specialty is teaching and calling New England-style contra dances. He is renowned for his knack of working with bands to match music to dances and for his humorous, smooth, concise teaching and warm presentation.
