Betty Stewart: A Life of Dancing

I know you've seen her. Promptly, at 7:45 PM each Saturday night, her ride drops her at the front door of the Fulton

Community Center and she walks with purpose to a seat at the back of the hall, which seems to be reserved just for her. Grinning from ear to ear, at 88 years old, Betty Stewart may not dance as much as she once did, but she seems to have just as much fun watching the contras from the sidelines as if she were the one twirling around and moving to the music.

husband, after the Second World War, to be near his parents. Betty loved dance as a child. She attended classes at a private school, owned by her cousin. She did ballet and tap among others. As an adult, Betty had the itch to try square dancing; her in-laws were big fans but she couldn't convince her husband to go. It wasn't until after her husband passed away that Betty would once again pursue her love of dance.

One day while reading through the local paper, Betty saw an ad calling for anyone interested in clogging to come join the group. "I was looking for something to do after my husband died", says Betty, "and it seemed like the thing for me. The ad said, just come, it doesn't matter your age or whether or not you can dance". She had once seen a clogging group from Eugene perform. "I thought it looked kind of klutzy," says Betty with a chuckle, "so it seemed like something I could do".

Thus was born the Stumptown Cloggers, back in about 1982. Their first meetings were held in someone's home until they realized that if they continued practicing there, they were going to wear out the rug. So, they moved their group to a building downtown where they held practices once a week. When it was time for their first performance, Betty said she was really nervous. "I remember seeing everyone out on the stage and my partner Danny said to me, 'It's too late now.' Everyone was there so I had to go", says Betty.

Looking at old videos of the Cloggers, you'd never guess Betty was ever shy about being in the limelight. In what she loved to call her "flirty skirts", chugging and stomping along with the other dancers, she now admits she "liked showing off" and "danced every chance" she got. "Audiences loved her. She hooted and hollered and her chugs were always right on time", says Rhonda, a friend and former Stumptown Clogger. "She'd always encourage us to be more animated; to throw up our arms more and kick our legs higher".

In her light-hearted way, Betty would refer to herself as "The Dinosaur" since she had been there from the group's inception. While she may have been the senior of the group by a couple of decades, that certainly did not slow her down. She helped to organize the musicians for their dances and would often inspire participation in future performances with her tireless spirit. "She'd say, 'These are the gigs that are upcoming, who can be there'"?, says Rhonda.

"Few of us stuck with it to the bitter end. I stayed with it because I was having so much fun. They were a good group. We had a good time. We were silly but we got the job done", says Betty. Before their split in the mid 1990's, the Stumptown Cloggers could list the Oregon State Fair, Folklife, old rodeos and many other folk events on their resumé.

In the meantime, Betty had discovered contra dancing and became a regular participant on Saturday nights and a lifetime member of the Portland Country Dance Community. Since retiring from her career as a librarian at the Central Library downtown, Betty has sought out many other interesting hobbies to enrich her life. She participates in yoga and Pilates. She attends live concerts put on by the Portland Folk Music Society, of which she is also a lifetime member, and she still finds the time to volunteer at her local library branch each week. "I didn't think I'd be around this long, but I don't have any plans on leaving soon", says Betty.
