# PCDC's Labor Day Weekend Dance & Music Camp

This year, Northwest Passage returns to our new home at Mt. Hood Kiwanis Camp for a four-day weekend of smooth, flowing, high-energy contra and English country dance. We've picked two bands that can play all-out for both dance styles, and a pair of callers renowned for their enjoyable teaching and superb dance choices.

Northwest dancers always look forward to a visit from caller **Joseph Pimentel**. He last called for our camp in 2003, the year that last-minute forest fires pushed us from Suttle Lake to Camp Namanu. Everyone still remembers the great time Joseph gave us in conjunction with **Goldcrest** (Daron Douglas, Dave Wiesler, and Paul Oorts), so we're bringing Goldcrest back this year, too!

Sharing the camp-house stage will be stellar New Jersey caller **Sue Dupré**, and hot young band **Night Watch**—Naomi Morse, Owen Morrison, and Elvie Miller. (Owen's name should be familiar to our 2009 alumni: he's also the guitarist for Elixir.)

Portland's own **John Oorthuys** will once again acoustically couple the band and caller's musical energy to your feet and heart. And **Beth Gibans** returns to care for your stomach (and heart) with her ultra-delicious, locally sourced cuisine.

As always, in addition to a full schedule of dance workshops and evening dance parties, you'll be choosing from a smorgasbord of music, calling, and singing workshops.

Mark your calendars now for **September 3-6, 2010**, and

#### **Joseph Pimentel**

Joseph combines cool dances, clear teaching, and respect for tradition. Dancing since the early 1980's in his native New England, he draws on many years of experience teaching contras and English country dance throughout the U.S. and abroad. Several of Joseph's own dances



are avid travelers too, and are published in "The Cardinal Collection." When not calling or dancing, Joseph can be found chasing birds in his adopted home of Texas.

#### Goldcrest

If you asked Joseph, he'd doubtless explain that a Goldcrest is a very small passerine bird of the kinglet family, resembling the Firecrest but with a plainer face. However, since *that* Goldcrest seldom visits North America, we're going with the

other one. Namely, fiddler **Daron Douglas**, pianist **Dave Wiesler**, and multi-instrumentalist **Paul Oorts**—three seasoned musicians of national reputation, steeped in the dance traditions of Appalachia, New England, and the British Isles.

Daron Douglas combines the precision and tone of a classical violinist with the energy and soul of an Appalachian fiddler. She grew up in the Appalachian hills, learning traditional ballads from her grandmother and studying classical music through college.



Daron has been on the staff of numerous CDSS dance camps and at the John C. Campbell Folk School in Brasstown, N.C. She also plays with the dance bands Foxfire and Misbehavin'

# Contra Dance, Then and Now

Part I

"All our dances are dance parties... everyone can take part." Written above each month's schedule of dances listed on Dudley and Jacqueline Laufman's website, this quote exemplifies in just a few short words, what Dudley has based his contra career on: inclusion. It doesn't matter if you are a beginner or an expert, an adult or a child; Dudley wants you to relax and have fun dancing and he's spent the last 55 years working to do just that.

As a testament to the significant contributions he has made to the contra dance community at large, Dudley was awarded a National Heritage Fellowship in May of 2009. This is the nation's highest honor in the folk and traditional arts. There is no question that Dudley deserves this honor.

In 1948, Dudley called his first dance at the age of 18, just three years after he had discovered the existence of traditional folk dancing while at a corn roast in rural New Hampshire. He was so inspired by the contra dance figures, lively tunes and sense of community, that he made it his mission to carry on this tradition so others could enjoy it as well.

Dudley followed in the footsteps of his mentor, Ralph Page, a name that is familiar to many dancers. Page is known for renewing interest in New England country dancing in the 1930's and '40's. He was different from other callers in that he made every effort to choose music and dances that allowed dancers of all levels to participate as much as possible. Some callers of the day were known to call complicated dances that left out beginners, but Page rejected that practice by keeping things simple.

Dudley too, focused on keeping his dances accessible and simple. Before he started calling dances however, he first taught himself how to play the harmonica, the accordion and then the fiddle. He eventually became adept at calling the dance and playing the accordion or fiddle at the same time. Later, he formed his own musical group, the Canterbury Country Dance Orchestra, which continues to play at dances and festivals to this day.

After years of calling and playing music, Dudley had a large following of his own, especially among young people, who found his youth and charismatic style exciting. By the late 1970's he was the most renowned caller in New England. His approach appealed to dancers of all levels, who seemed to enjoy his penchant for traditional contra dance music and dances from the greater New England area. In fact, a lot of the dancers who followed Dudley in the '60's and '70's were responsible for spreading interest in traditional New England dancing to other parts of the country.

Not only was Dudley famous for his inclusion of all levels of dancers, but callers and musicians looked to him as a mentor. To this day, Dudley shares what he has learned and encourages others to uphold the music and dance traditions he so dearly values. He and his wife, Jacqueline, play the fiddle together at various dances and camps and have recently published an instruction book entitled "Traditional Barn Dances with Calls and Fiddling". They hold traditional New England barn dances throughout the year and even open up their home for a dance every fifth Saturday.

This is just a short summary of Dudley's legacy and there is certainly more to be uncovered.\* As a champion of bringing young people into the contra dance fold, I can't help but wonder what he and other folk dance pioneers make of the latest trend among the college-age crowd: Crossover Contra. In Part 2 of Contra, Then and Now, I'll explore this new trend, how it is manifesting itself here on the West Coast and what it could mean for the future of traditional contra dance.

and various pit orchestras and blues bands. She now lives and plays music in New Orleans.

Dave Wiesler has built a national reputation for his rhythmic and innovative piano playing. At home in a huge range of styles, Dave plays for concerts and dances of many sorts: contra, swing, vintage, couple dance, English and Scottish country dance. He has performed at the Kennedy Center, the Washington Folk-Life Festival, the Honolulu Academy of Arts, and the Smithsonian Museum, and he has played at festivals and dance camps across the country as well as in Canada, Scotland, and England. Dave has over a dozen recordings to his credit, many featuring tunes and songs he wrote, and is also a capable guitarist and singer. His other bands include Laura and the Lava Lamps, Cabaret Sauvignon, The Avant Gardeners, The Gigmeisters, Green Light Karma, and Thistle House. Dave presently lives in Newark, Delaware.

Paul Oorts is much in demand on the dance circuit for his driving world rhythms, improvisations and stylistic versatility. Paul plays an astonishing array of instruments, including mandolin, tenor and five-string banjos, cittern, musette accordion, dulcimers, and guitars in many different tunings and styles. A native of Belgium, he is well versed in Flemish and continental European music and performs regularly at the Belgian Embassy with his wife, Karen Ashbrook. Paul is an adjunct professor of French and Italian at the Peabody Conservatory of Music in Baltimore, and teaches fretted instruments privately. He also founded, conducts and arranges music for Carillon, a hammered dulcimer orchestra. His recordings include *Celtic Café* with Karen Ashbrook, *Momentum* with Steve Schneider, and numerous appearances on albums released by the Azalea City label.
