Northwest Passage

PCDC's Labor Day Weekend Dance & Music Camp

Plan on four fabulous days of high-energy contras and squares at this year's Northwest Passage camp. We've gathered an amazing collection of talent for your enjoyment—from New England and the Southeast to the Midwest and Texas—from old-time roots music to rock and roll—from a legendary caller with more than six decades of experience to a player of driving fiddle tunes who's too young to drive.

When the Northwest Passage committee was tossing around names of callers who'd do a great job at both contras and squares, we immediately thought of Atlanta native **Cis Hinkle**. With an international reputation for her skill and enthusiasm, Cis was an obviously ideal choice.

But coming up with our second name was quite the challenge. So many callers are awesome at contras but not squares. Or vice-versa. Or else they've called at our camp too recently. Or else... Finally, one committee member exclaimed in frustration, "Well why don't we just go all out and invite **Ralph Sweet**?" We all stopped and looked at each other. "Is he still calling?" "Does he still do dance camps?" "Has he ever been to the West Coast?"

Somebody suggested that maybe we should ask *Ralph* those questions. And the rest, this September, is about to become Pacific Northwest dance history.

Such a sensational pair of callers deserves an equally jaw-dropping brace of bands. So we invited everyone's favorite midwestern practitioner of the plectrum, Sam Bartlett, to bring his band **Evil Diane** – consisting of Sam, Abby Ladin, Matt Brown, and Jim Nelson. And then we turned to a source seldom tapped by northwest camps – Austin, Texas – for the incredible five-piece **Lost & Nameless Orchestra** (Chris E. Peterson, Patrick Conway, Kimberly Zilenicki, Nathan Quiring, and Chris Carroll).

To our delight, Portland's own **John Oorthuys** has once again enthusiastically agreed to bridge the sonic gap between stage and dancers. And **Beth Gibans** will return with her delicious, energy-packed, locally sourced cuisine.

As always, in addition to a full schedule of dance workshops and evening dance parties, a variety of music, calling and singing workshops will compete for your attention.

Mark your calendars now for **September 2-5, 2011**, and keep your eyes open for the camp applications that will appear by early May in your mailboxes, at local dances, and at www.NWPassageDanceCamp.org.

Ralph Sweet started calling in 1948...and he hasn't stopped yet.

Ralph's first exposure to contras came from a recreational folk dance book his mother had left lying around their Connecticut home. The little diagrams and descriptions intrigued him, but by then contra dancing had died out nearly everywhere except for a few small towns in Vermont and New Hampshire. So by the time Ralph got to the University of

Connecticut and started calling, it was a community of traditional square dancers that he joined.

At that time, "traditional" squares meant singing squares. The recently introduced portable PA systems allowed callers to be heard over the dancing without straining their voices, and so the former intermittent bark-



ing of commands had been replaced by calls matched to well-known tunes, with the dancers singing along. Ralph drove all over New England, studying callers and writing down dances.

The Korean War found Ralph in the National Guard. Guard training took him to Georgia and Texas, where his nights were spent in a different kind of training, including Kentucky running sets and modern western style squares. Eventually his gunnery unit got transferred to Boston – to defend the nation against North Korean bombers – and Ralph tried out every kind of dance he could find, including the contras run by Ralph Page and Ted Sannella.

After the war, Ralph led a busy schedule calling both traditional and modern western square dances. He converted an 1845 barn into his own dance hall, which is still going strong today. But he never lost his interest in contras. He would try calling some from time to time, but his singing-square dancers considered the unsung, repetitive contras to be the most boring and old-fashioned things they'd ever encountered.

It took the American Bicentennial to stir up enough interest in colonial culture for Ralph to be able to launch a couple of successful Connecticut contra dances. Coinciding with the New England contra revival begun a few years earlier by Dudley Laufman, the time was finally right for Ralph's full-fledged entry into the contra world.

At 81, Ralph is still busy calling dances throughout the Connecticut/Massachusetts region, and at his own Powder Mill Barn. In any contra evening he always throws in a few squares. And you can be sure that in an evening of squares he'll still try to get those square dancers to try a few contras.

Ralph's latest project is *On the Beat with Ralph Sweet*, a collection of dances and commentary he assembled last year with the help of his protégé Nils Fredland.

Evil Diane. A midwestern-based collective of old-time music maniacs, Evil Diane coalesced for the express purpose of playing blistering, scintillating, pulsing, and fabulous dance music. Each member of the band is a veteran of countless music and dance events around the country, as well as being top finishers at the mecca of old-time, the Appalachian String Band Music Festival in West Virginia. Together, the band has

a total of 90 years of experience playing for dancers!

Sam Bartlett, known to contra dancers everywhere from his playing with such bands as Wild Asparagus, Notorious, and The Monks, is a rabidly entertaining and



irrepressible banjo, mandolin, and guitar player – famous not only for his fine musicianship but also for his expertise in the erudite field of stuntology. Sam's original tunes are played all across the country and his music has been featured and profiled on NPR's *All Things Considered*, Salon.com, and *The Thistle & Shamrock*. *Sing Out!* magazine has declared him a member of "the rhythm players hall of fame."

Jim Nelson is a 25-year veteran of the old-time music and dance scenes. More than just accompaniment, Jim's guitar



playing is a vital part of whatever ensemble he's a part of. He has played and recorded with the St. Louis-based III-Mo Boys, the Volo Bogtrotters, and many other midwest ensembles. Jim has taught guitar classes at the Augusta Heritage Center in West Virginia, and given numerous workshops on old-time back-up guitar at festivals across the country. He currently

plays throughout the Midwest and South with several old-time dance bands, including Big Limber, the Little Egypt Pep-Steppers, Evil Diane, and the Wabash Valley Cannonballs.

Matt Brown performs American roots music with a deft touch and a smile. An innovative fiddler, an intricate banjo

player, a propulsive guitar player, and a moving singer, Matt educates his audiences as he entertains with a varied program of traditional music: sprightly square dance tunes, haunting banjo pieces, and a variety of songs from blues to ballads. Much of his repertoire comes from the Appalachian South, but he also loves sharing the songs of his home state, Pennsylvania. Matt teaches traditional music in a variety of



settings, and is also an active producer, studio musician, and partner in 5-String Productions, an independent label specializing in acoustic music.

Bassist **Abby Ladin** grew up immersed in the East Coast traditional folk music revival of the 1970's. She was clogging

by the age of 6, performing with her sister Evie by age 10, and touring nationally at 18 with the renowned dance and music company Rhythm In Shoes. She has backed up some of this country's finest fiddlers, not only lending the percussive strength of her bass, but also blending harmony vocals with



sweet simplicity. For over 15 years she has been the bassist for the popular dance band The Monks. Abby also tours with old-time string band The New Mules and has taught at camps, schools and workshops all over the country.

Cascade Promenade

And more is what you'll find during the second annual Cascade Promenade weekend which is happening this year from Thursday March 10th through Sunday March 13th. The event consists of various contra, English and waltz dances being held from Seattle to Eugene over the course of 4 days, starting with the annual Lake City (Seattle) Contra Marathon (a benefit for NW Folklife) on Thursday: 3 straight hours of contra dancing with 17 callers, multiple musicians, no breaks, and no walk-throughs. On Friday, there are contra dances in Seattle (Emerald City), Vancouver (Contra in the 'Couve) and Eugene (the regular Sat. dance switches to Friday) as well as an evening waltz workshop and dance in Olympia, and the regular English country dance in Portland. On Saturday morning, you can contra dance in Olympia starting at 10:30 to the music of

Cubic Roots. After a break for lunch, during which you can choose to join the locals for a community meal, there's more dancing in Olympia from 1:30 to 3:30 with caller Woody Lane and Riffraff.

Of course everyone knows what comes next – The Portland Megaband! Dancers from north, south, east and west will converge in Portland to let caller Erik

Weberg and the biggest (and best-looking!) contra dance band in the world light their contra fire. The dance goes from 8 to 11 PM and of course you will go right home after that and get plenty of sleep (and

clocks ahead!) because on Sunday, you will be dancing all the live-long day at the Portland Roadhouse Dance in Milwaukie, just a few minutes south of Portland. Dancing starts at 11 AM and goes all the way to 9 PM. To keep things fresh, the bands and callers will change every hour or so, which means that you get to dance to 8 different callers and 8 different bands, all of

whom reside in the Pacific Northwest. (Of course!) And they are, in order of appearance... Eric Curl with Tapsalteerie; Luther Black with The Barnstormers; Mary Devlin with Wild Hair; Sue

Baker with Lisa Ornstein & Dan Compton; Amy Wimmer with The Steeltones; William Watson with Fresh Cider; Susie Kendig with Zephyr; and Woody Lane calling with The Nettles.
