Northwest Passage 2018: PCDC's Labor Day Dance & Music Camp

Anon! The spring, clad all in gladness, doth laugh at winter's sadness. Traditional music and dance lovers near and far can look forward to this year's all-English Northwest Passage, August 31 to September 3. PCDC's Labor Day dance & music camp will once again be happening at the Kiwanis Camp on the beautiful slopes of Mt. Hood, this year featuring the thrilling music of **Persons of Quality** (Jon Berger, Rebecca King and Jim Oakden), **Fine Companions** (Betsy Branch, Bill Tomczak, Erik Weberg and Mark Douglass) and the elegant dance leading of **Kalia Kliban** and **David Millstone**.

Flyers will be available at local dances in mid-April and will also be emailed to PCDC members and past Northwest Passage attendees. Registration will be online only, opening on May 1. Partial grants are available for PCDC members at www.portlandcountrydance.org/pcdc-grants.

With this year's Northwest Passage, PCDC continues its commitment to expanding dance horizons by annually alternating English and American dance programs. This year's camp offers an all-English program of dance and music plus a wide range of high-quality workshops in instrumental music, singing and calling.

This is Northwest Passage's third all-English weekend, and it's a great opportunity for ECD aficionados to revel in the company of great dancers and musicians, as well as a chance for newcomers to get to know and love the elegance and sumptuousness of this traditional art form. Beginners as well as experienced ECD dancers are lucky to be able to enjoy English dancing in a relaxed and friendly setting every Friday night in Portland at the Burlingame Water Tower Dance Hall.

As always, camp will offer the famous cuisine of Beth Gibans, as well as the spacious dance floor and rustic but comfortable accommodations of the Kiwanis Camp. **John Oorthuys** will provide excellent sound reinforcement.

Persons of Quality are three talented musicians who, playing a wide array of instruments, perform English country dance music with enthusiasm, driving rhythm and imagination.

Jon Berger started playing violin in the fourth grade, but didn't discover folk music until he was asked to learn some Irish fiddle tunes to play in the background while working as a stage technician for a production of Brendan Behan's "The Hostage." He has been playing for English, Irish, Scottish, French and American folk dancers for over

35 years. He toured with the Celtic rock band Tempest for two years, and currently plays with Sonoma county Celtic fusion band Greenhouse.



Rebecca King is a versatile dance pianist, conductor and composer, whose strong classical training and love of jazz shows in her rhythmic and lyrical piano accompaniments. She plays at English and contra dances in the greater San Francisco Bay area and has been on staff at Pinewoods and at various West Coast dance camps, weekends and balls. By day, she teaches music in the Sonoma Valley schools.

Jim Oakden started playing piano and clarinet at an early age and stumbled into early music from the classical music scene. After six years performing early music, he discovered the world of traditional and ethnic music. Having diverse tastes, he has played in many bands and performs on an absurd number of instruments, including accordion, mandolin, several styles of bagpipes, recorders, whistle and zurna. A dancer himself, he specializes in playing for dancers whether it be ECD, contra, Morris, Irish, Breton/French, Greek or Bulgarian. He has been on staff at myriad dance camps throughout the country.

Kalia Kliban has been part of the California Bay Area



traditional dance scene since the mid-1980's, performing and teaching in a wide range of styles. At dance camps and festivals across the country she has taught Morris, Long Sword, English and American clogging, English country dance and contra. She is a regular contra and English caller in the vibrant Bay Area dance community. Her welcoming and relaxed teaching style has helped dancers of all levels experience the joy of traditional dance.

The Courtesy In That Turn



By its very nature, dancing is a form of non-verbal communication. At its best, partners will read each other's stance, demeanor, energy and eye contact and together reach a style in as little as eight beats that meets the comfort levels of both parties. Alas, sometimes one partner isn't paying attention to these non-verbal cues and one person walks away annoyed, with a wrenched shoulder or fully creeped out while the other party walks away oblivious. In an effort to avoid such sad scenarios, I've compiled a list of what I hope are helpful tactics. This is by no means a comprehensive or authoritative "how to" it's just what I have found helpful in my own experience. I have been on both the giving and receiving end of such encounters and hope my thoughts can help to feed a community-wide conversation in how to navigate these circumstances in a way that leaves everyone feeling respected and appreciated.

The Ask. Every dance begins with an ask. Why not follow it up with a few more: Who's leading? Do you enjoy flourishes? If you are recovering from an injury, or you're just feeling a bit run down, mention this to your partner! If you are hoping to swing fast, swap roles mid-dance or other such shenanigans, ask if your partner is up for it.

"He-Man" vs. "Wet Noodle." Some folks (and this can be people of any gender) are not cognizant of their own

strength and dance with a gusto that can quite literally cause their partner injuries. Should you find yourself on the receiving end of an overly aggressive allemande or swing, tell them to take it down a notch or two. You might be saving not only your own shoulder but that of every other dancer in



allemande. Seriously guys, we know you're tough but there's no need to injure one another! On the flip side, if you are dancing with a wet noodle this could be an indication that you are dancing with a novice. Take a mental note and don't initiate flourishes, or swing too fast.

Flourishes. Invite your partner to execute flourishes by leading clearly but not forcefully. A partner can reject an offer of a flourish at any time, and shouldn't need Herculean strength to do so. To reject an invitation of a flourish, use your body to resist the maneuver. For example, if the lead raises your hand to twirl, bring your hand back down. If your partner doesn't take the hint, shake your head and/or say "No". Do not initiate flourishes with novice dancers unless you have talked about it first.

Eye Contact & Flirtation. If you find yourself uncomfortable with the intense gaze of your dance partner, break eye contact and focus somewhere else. A forehead, chin or ear all work well without causing dizziness. If you are gazing intently at your partner and that person is not gazing back into your eyes, follow their cue and look elsewhere. If you are both enjoying the intense eye contact, have fun with it, but do keep in mind that flirting on the dance floor does not mean that person

There will be three public hearings on the whole city budget: April 3, April 17 and May 10. These will be our only opportunities to turn out a mass showing for saving Fulton. The earlier two dates will be a better chance to divert the course of the bulldozers.

wants to date you. To figure that one out, you will have to use verbal communication at a later time.

Too Close. If you find yourself dancing too close for comfort, straighten your arms to put more distance

between yourself and your partner. Conversely if you find your partner straightening arms to put more distance between you, you are dancing too close. Be considerate and back off. Ignoring your partner's cues to put more distance between you will



quickly give you the reputation of being creepy.

If these techniques don't work, you still have options. First, talk to the person in a kind way and clearly tell them what is not working for you when you dance together. Most of the time the person receiving this news will be embarrassed but grateful to learn how to be a better partner. If you cannot resolve the issue with a polite conversation, you are encouraged to talk to one of the dance organizers (often found at the front table). PCDC reserves the right to exclude participants who exhibit inappropriate or unsafe behavior. Remember also that an invitation to dance is simply an invitation. You may always say no to an invitation, and in fact, dance with someone else for that very same dance.

PCDC Board Meeting Minutes

December 19, 2017. Present: Christine Appleberry, Rich Goss, Noah Grunzweig, Jaydra Perfetti, Sue Songer, Mike Voss.

New Business: Sue Songer was welcomed to the board.

Youth Dance W/E: Sue has been in conversation with concerned parties. Discussion of impact on NWP. Speculative discussion about talent and draw. Techno? Or showcase nascent bands? Board approved a \$3500 grant as well as a \$3500 loan to the organizers. Insurance from National Folk Organization. Sue and NWFolklife use this.

Treasurer: Need to generate board and volunteer support for finding a new bank and establishing what exactly we need and what the bank will provide. Jaydra to follow through. Still scanning old records. Discussion of cash/check handling. How is income aggregated for deposit?

Contra Committee: Lights were turned off at Fulton for the Techno on 12/9, including in the stairwells leading to the restrooms which led to an accident. These lights must remain ON at all times. Discussion of hall manager duties to prep the hall for safety. A map of light switch locations and functions will be created. Also: discussion of how to build cohesion in the Contra Committee. If this includes a pre-meeting dinner, who would pay?

Megaband: Admission will be on a sliding scale \$10-25. 275 advance tickets will be available. Advance tickets will be strongly recommended due to smaller hall this year. Tshirts available online per request from Contra Committee. CC can set up online PayPal for tickets and shirts. Needs to be set up soon. T-shirts sold to public are not priced at cost as they are for MB members. At this year's hall the risers can be left until Monday morning. Will rent stanchions for dancer/band separation. David Blanchard is researching parking strategies. There is another event (costume ball) the same night in the same building.

ECD: Ball was a success. Still discussing caller for 2018. **Raindance:** Registration opens 1/1. There is an article in Footnotes. Discussion of how changing banks would affect

NWPassage: Will discuss Youth Camp at meeting in Jan.

Membership: Currently 295.

Other business: Should we have another summer picnic? Discussion of the feasibility of a Megaband Flash Mob event possibly at Director's square before the Starlight parade weekend. Would city permits be needed?

Mike is going off the board in June due to term limits. Discussion of possible replacements, mail collection and distribution. Will pursue moving PO Box to Multnomah Village Post Office.

January 16, 2017 Present: Rich Goss, Noah Grunzweig, Jaydra Perfetti, Sue Songer, Mike Voss.

Treasurer: 1099 will be ready by the end of the month. Met with Dave Macemon to integrate ECD with Quickbooks online. Continuing training with Ed on QB. A checking account is now linked to PayPal. Current balance is approximately \$90K.

ECD: New admission prices went into effect on Jan 1, 2018. All prices went up \$1, the first increase in 20 years. ECD Community Dance Band project is moving along. Rehearsal schedules are being discussed. The band will play a dance at Fulton, tentatively scheduled for May 4.

ECD Ball Committee: Meeting on 1/19, to select the caller & program for 2018.

Contra Committee: New members are Lindsey Grayzel, Marianne O'Doherty (secretary) and Ann Nokes; Bette Laucks is off. Publicity: Mike Goren and Beth Hansen. Discussion of New Year's Eve dance and another Techno contra, run by Noah and Jaydra.

Raindance: Registration is open.

NW Passage: No changes in committee members. Concern was expressed about Youth Camp. Considering KGB for next year; they can play both contra and English, will advise in April. Discussion of future of NWP. Likely to continue alternating between English and contra.

Grants: One grant of \$100 was issued. **Membership:** 293 as of Jan. 2018.

Web Subcommittee: The website has been updated to reflect the new ECD prices. Other minor Wordpress updates were applied.

Family Dance: More PCDC involvement is needed as there have been communication problems: a recent dance was cancelled without notice to anyone, including the band. A subcommittee is needed to organize this dance and develop publicity. Used to be a huge dance, not so much now. Discussion of how to find organizers. Meet with Wade? Support the family dance community in forming an organizer search committee? Sue will attend the next dance and discuss support by PCDC.

Other business: The Parks Department is again talking about closing the Fulton Community Center. The Parks Department online survey was filled out by many. The next step is to attend budget meetings en masse. It's important to organize beforehand and develop a list of bullet points to present at the meetings. Christine and Kim are spearheading this effort. Discussion of a ballot referendum for parks money. Multnomah Arts Center (MAC) now has a wood floor and could serve as a replacement for Fulton but availability is a serious issue. Another option is to find a fixer-upper for purchase or long-term lease. PCDC would use the facility and rent it out. A full-time hall manager would be needed. Form a hall-search committee to pursue a suitable venue?

There was a discussion about liability issues. Does PCDC have any disclaimer language stating that participants in its events acknowledge that dancing is a physical activity and that by paying admission or submitting a registration, they agree not to hold PCDC and/or its associates/affiliates liable for any injury occurring while at the event/activity? In other words do we have any wording to protect ourselves from lawsuits? If not, should we, and do we want it to be generally applicable to all PCDC events or something each event/activity comes up with on its own? Further discussion is needed.


