

PCDC COVID Safety Policy Survey, Survey Says...?

In October, the PCDC Board sent a request to PCDC membership and participants in PCDC events (a total of 755 Email addresses) asking for feedback on our current COVID Safety policies and potential changes. We received 176 responses! The PCDC Board learned a lot from these answers, and we wanted to be sure to share the results with you.

The first link is the standard report output from Google Forms. It contains predefined charts from the "pick an answer" questions as well as all the comments that were entered for open ended questions. This document contains everything that was entered, except for the names of the responders. As an example, this chart from the report shows how the 176 responders answered the question: "How likely are you to attend a PCDC event based on various masking and vaccination requirements?"

The second link provides all the raw data (except for the names of the people who responded) in spreadsheet format. For you data nerds out there who enjoy Excel pivot tables, you can mine the data to answer questions like: "How do contra (or English) dancers who were regular attendees prior to COVID feel about the masking requirements?"

Over the last several months, I have interviewed and told the stories of many of the volunteers in our midst who keep our Portland Country Dance Community chugging along.

Here is what volunteers have to say about their experiences volunteering:

Rich Goss: "I just love dancing. I contribute what I can and have made a lot of good friends who I love. Sometimes, as a volunteer, you deal with hard things but you make the best decisions you can and try to do the right thing.

"It's just a good thing to do. When you go to a dance, you don't really get to know people but if you serve on a committee, be a part of what makes the community work, you get to know people and make good friends."

Ethel Gillette: "I've been Chair of the [NW Passage] Committee since joining; I'm good at organizing and Rich does the publicity, something he is good at. There are really nice people on the committee whom we have taken great pleasure in getting to know better and we enjoy the weekend itself very much. My most memorable experience has been finally feeling fluent in English dancing, being able to be playful with it, not focus so much on learning. I also really enjoyed a singing workshop Rich and I led at last year's camp."

Jon Neff: As a musician, Jon is already giving to his audience, our community. But he also has taken advantage of many other opportunities.

"I like knowing so many people in the community and, in the membeship world, seeing their names in front of me." Offering one's services and sharing one's talent is an enjoyable way of being connected. "It is part of the glue that ties people together, it says, 'I belong'."

Sara Munz: Sara likes volunteering because she likes seeing "how the sausage is made" and getting to know like-minded dancers on a deeper, more meaningful level. She also realizes that

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Building a Dance Culture of Consent

As part of our ongoing work to promote a welcoming and inclusive dance community committed to providing a fun and safe environment for everyone (see our etiquette and safety guidelines adopted in 2021), PCDC Portland Contra Committee engaged Alan Kline to facilitate a discussion about creating a dance culture based on consent. We asked Alan to join us because he has worked on this issue for many years as a contradance organizer in the Bay Area. Organizers from six area contra dances (PCDC Portland, PCDC Hillsboro, Joyride, 1st Saturday, 3rd Saturday and ContraRemix) participated. Among us were dancers, musicians and callers. It was an opportunity to have a conversation with each other about consent, share our experiences on the dance floor, and brainstorm about next steps for our community. I came away with a deeper understanding of the need for building a dance culture based on consent, the challenges and rewards of doing so, and a commitment to continue in the work. Just as important, by the end of the evening, we knew each other better and had learned from each other.

What is Consent?

Consent is foundational for a welcoming environment. Alan offered this succinct definition of consent in the dance context: **consent is present when we agree with everything being done with or to our body.** In other words, we respect the bodily autonomy of each dancer and recognize the need for obtaining their consent. In this way, much of what we think of as bad dance etiquette and unsafe dancing is a violation of consent.

To have a dance culture of consent, members of the community need to understand consent, be invested in it, and be supportive of each other. A culture of consent imposed from the top down won't last. Education and meaningful dialogue are key. He encouraged us to see the goal as "moving the needle" by creating a shift towards more consent, communication, and conversation in our community. One workshop, one announcement during a dance, or one article in Footnotes is not going to magically give us a dance community based on consent, but each of these has the potential to move us in that direction.

We assume a certain amount of consent by someone's mere presence at a dance. An example is the consent to be touched appropriately during the dance. There is both spoken/explicit consent and unspoken/assumed consent. One step forward would be to move more consent into the spoken/explicit kind. An example is the initial conversation with your partner, which could go something like this: "Would you like to dance? Which role do you prefer? Are you comfortable with close swings? Do you like to spin? Do you like flourishes?" In a brief period of time, we've communicated to our partner our own needs and preferences, shown them that we care about their needs and preferences, and have set us up for a great dance experience. It might feel awkward the first times we have these conversations, but the payoff could be big.

Consent can, on very rare occasion, work against the value of inclusivity. For example, a dancer who is not committed to consent and continually behaves so even after their inappropriate behavior has been brought to their attention and they have been given opportunities to change, may ultimately be excluded from the community if they refuse to change their behavior. 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A DANCE RETURNS

The Second Sunday English Dance for Experienced Dancers resumed on January 8, 2023. The band Fine Companions (Betsy Branch, Lisa Scott, Bill Tomczak and Erik Weberg) and excellent callers will provide an inspiring experience for dancers to refine their dancing through styling and connecting to the music and dance partners. Building a Dance Culture of Consent

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
that's not the main purpose of consent. Its overriding purpose is to contribute to a welcoming and safe environment where all dancers feel respected and valued.

The caller for the dance is essentially the leader for the dance, sets the tone for the evening, and contributes to creating the welcoming environment we all want. One way they do this is by including consent as a topic during the newcomer's lesson, while teaching each dance, and with their comments between dances. Alan encouraged us to let our callers know what is important to us. Callers want everyone to have a good dance experience and they understand that consent is a big part of that.

Feedback on the Dance Floor

Alan shared with us the importance of giving feedback to build up dancers and the community, rather than using it only in a negative way. For example, at the end of the dance, we can tell our partner what went well: "I liked the way you supported me in the swing." "The way you helped me get back in the dance when I got lost was great." "Those flourishes were so much fun." "Thanks for being so playful!" And when a complaint is received about a dancer's behavior, the conversation might go like this: "You have been doing this [specific behavior] and it makes folks uncomfortable (or has the potential to cause injury or is disruptive to the line, etc.). We want you to have a good experience at dances and some folks won't dance with you anymore because you do this."

Ventilation. That's the big problem. As in—Norse Hall has very little ventilation. Also there's no outdoor space to retire to. No place to take off the mask and have a snack. A whole weekend spent enclosed with 200 people...we know some dancers are ready for full engagement, no problem mode. Some are not at all. As producers, we are not ready to create that yet.

So, with great expectations, we look forward to a continuing recovery and a relaunching of Raindance on the fourth weekend of April in 2024.

Until then—don't let yourself go. You're going to need to keep that elegant, frisky body ready to roll for Raindance 2024.

ows. It struck me, and others, that we were experiencing what contra dancing was like a couple hundred years ago, long before electric lighting and sound amplification. We enjoyed a magical waltz, chattered through a lively break, and continued dancing in the near dark. When the power came back on, a full-throated "Aaawwww!!" arose from the dance floor as we were all suddenly-and reluctantly-thrust back into 21st century reality.

the dancing that has been such a big and long-standing part of her life, the dancing that she enjoys and misses so much, doesn't just happen by itself. It's people working together to plan and execute the dances that keeps them vibrant and alive.

Tyler Robinson: "I have enjoyed helping out at special events like our New Year's Dance and very much look forward to doing so again. I like helping out with door duty at all of our dances, greeting and welcoming everyone at the door.

"I'm really glad to see younger dancers stepping up to volunteer because it will keep our community going.

"I recognize how fortunate Portland is to have so many musicians to play for our dances, both contra and English. I think this is due, in large part, to 30 years of PCDC Tune Sessions, first hosted by Dan Compton and George Penk and now Betsy Branch and George. I think this is, in part, how we have the Portland Megaband! A whole band of volunteers!

"And we are so lucky to have so many dances—every Saturday night and Joyride once a month. In the world of contra and English dancing, our community of musicians and dancers are a blessing."

The wonderful thing volunteering provides is the opportunity to give back at any level of involvement and commitment of time-from flipping burgers at the picnic, to sitting at the door of a dance, helping set up an event, close down an event, or join a dance weekend or special event committee. Becoming a volunteer is an occasion to share your special skills as part of a team of volunteers creating opportunities for us all to dance and enjoy each other's company.

How does one become a volunteer? In the "Before Times" it was often a personal request or suggestion, one person to another. Covid has made this difficult.

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"Volunteering is a great way to meet people and it gives me value as a person to support others having access to a safe place to have fun. I work with people who have fun organizing and planning dances and community-building events. In a way, volunteering is its own community, as well as a creative activity."

A lot of us aren't comfortable with giving negative feedback and even more uncomfortable with receiving negative feedback. But we can take a couple minutes during announcements to practice, and if done right, it can be fun. "Let's all practice telling your partners that they're holding you too close." "Let's all practice telling your partners that they are pinching your arm in a swing." You get the idea. We'll be more comfortable with feedback if we get the chance to practice saying what we don't want and, equally important, asking for something different. This exercise could also give us practice in taking feedback well. Practicing responses of "I'm sorry. I didn't realize I was doing that," or "Please tell me what would be better" can make for an improved dance experience for everyone.

One of the challenges of giving feedback in the dance context is that everything happens so quickly and then we're on to the next move or the next hands-four. And at the end of the dance, we might not even remember who it was that did that thing that was uncomfortable. Calmly saying "ouch" or "stop that please" in the moment is important, even if that's all we can get out of our mouths before we spin into the next move.

Resources and Next Steps

Near the end of the workshop, we identified resources we have and steps we could take to "move the needle":

- Consciously model the behavior we want to see in others
- Check-in with new dancers to be sure they feel welcomed and to see if they have any concerns
- Ask experienced dancers who appreciate consent to dance with newcomers and with those in the community who do not engage in consent
- Have personal conversations with dancers you thought were uncomfortable check-in to see if they have concerns
- Present very short skits (like public service announcements) during

OUTREACH TASK FORCE

- Spreading the word about our dances—how and where
- Informing newcomers about the many aspects of our dance community
- Explaining the benefits of joining PCDC
- Designing informational material

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announcement time at dances of specific examples of consent and communication

- Write Footnotes articles about topics related to safety and consent. Give an example in each issue
- Post small items on Facebook: how to help newcomers feel welcome, how to communicate with your partner, how to give feedback, how to take feedback
- Educate volunteers and committee members about consent and how it creates a welcoming environment
- Post other contra organization's YouTube videos about consent on our Facebook page and website
- Get more serious about feedback from dancers—get better signage for the Comment Box and Comment Book and encourage their use more frequently

In looking back on the discussion, Mike Goren shared this: "One of my main takeaways from the workshop was the reminder of focusing on building norms of consent in a positive sense in the community, not *only* focusing on handling complaints, etc.—though of course that is essential and without that you can't even begin building a welcoming community. I think we're making a good start on building norms but there are so many opportunities for more work on that. To *Continued on page 12*

Covid Policies: Discussed next steps in publishing our member survey results on the website and in Footnotes.

Logo and publicity task forces: The logo group has hired a designer and presented some new sample proposals. The Board gave feedback and we will continue revisions. Once the logo is done, a publicity group will revise our outreach tri-fold with a post pandemic update. Ric, Lindsey, and Mike offered to work on this.

Special Event: The Christine and Kim Appleberry December 3rd event will have no food or drink due to the cold and masking requirements.

Portland Contra: George Marshall was in town and Sue arranged for a last-minute replacement hall for the event (Thank you, Sue!) PCDC made \$100 out of the event. New Year's Eve schedule is being put together. Gordy is challenged getting bands for the season.

Megaband: The band will be approximately 75 people this with a lot of newcomers. Calling will be done by a group of local callers instead of Erik Weberg and will be held at Oaks Park.

English Country Dance: The 2nd Sunday Experienced ECD series restarts in January. Music will be based around Fine Companions and Lisa Scott will coordinate callers. The committee presented an updated charter adding regular attendance at dances as a requirement to be on the committee.

ECD Ball: The Ball was held at Oaks Park with 86 registered vs 144 pre-pandemic. The event moves to 1st Friday/Saturday in November for 2023. Erik Weberg will call. Laura Hatch will call for 2024. The after-Ball brunch privately sponsored by Ric and Stewart Hall and was well received with 50 people attending.

Northwest Passage: Ric has found 6 people interested in joining the committee or volunteering. An initial meeting is being set up. A list of potential volunteers, 2022 donors, and year-to-date financials was presented.

Membership: Counts are up 6 for the month and up 89 compared to last year.

Community Values and Safety task forces: Another copy of the proposed Mission/Vision/etc. statements will be sent to the membership. Some hands-on safety training has been conducted. Next steps involve committee/Board communications and how/when to reach out to other communities when incidents happen.

Board Officer/Committee Responsibilities: Discussions continued regarding event treasurer procedures and potential conflicts of an event treasurer also being PCDC treasurer. A job description for event treasurers will be drafted by David.

Website: "About PCDC" paragraph has been added to our home page. Updated Covid policies were posted. The ECD Ball committee has been added to the Board/Committee page. PCDC dance series were added to the portlanddancing.com website.

Portland Contra: Committee is getting ready for New Year's Eve dance. With no Raindance 2023, PCDC may not have enough events at Norse Hall for "favorite renter" discounts. Committee is looking into partnering with other groups and/or co-sponsoring events.

Megaband: Admissions will be a sliding \$15-\$30. 2023 will be at Oak Parks which is smaller than PSU, but post Covid attendances are down in general, so we expect no problems.

Northwest Passage: Deb Ralls and Laura Hatch will join the Committee. The Board discussed and ok'd also having out-of-towners participate on the NWP committee. 2023 planned staff is Brad Foster & Orly Krasner calling, with Goldcrest and Fine Companions as the bands.

Membership: Counts are down 14 for the month and up 71 compared to last year.

Community Values task force: Work continues on the bylaws rewrite and there will be proposed procedures on how to make Board elections more transparent at the next Board meeting.

Board Officer/Committee Responsibilities: Rick Kimball offered to run for PCDC Treasurer in June. The policy on Officers only participating on one other committee was revised to allow the Board to make exemptions. This allows David to be approved as Treasurer for the current fiscal year ending in May.
